## Pledge Summary

Lakeland is a city in Central Florida with a current population of 126,248 and a population growth of 2.51% annually. Lakeland is located just south of the Green Swamp Wilderness Preserve and has 38 named lakes within its city limits. Lakeland prides itself in having 76 park facilities and an urban forest consisting of 65,000 plus trees. Hollis Garden, Lakeland's downtown botanical display garden, is a Certified Butterfly Garden with the North American Butterfly Association (NABA) and many other park areas throughout the city are dedicated to native plantings that provide habitats for Monarch Butterflies and other pollinators. This includes Crago Park and a 1.2-acre wetland prairie dedicated specifically to Monarchs. Mayor Mutz of Lakeland, Florida has committed to saving the monarch butterfly and other pollinators by signing the Mayor's Monarch Pledge and looks forward to engaging residents in building more pollinator habitats throughout the city.

## Action Items Committed for 2024

### Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. (If you have community members who speak a language other than English, we encourage you to also communicate in that language; Champion Pledges must communicate in that language.)
- Engage with community garden groups and urge them to plant native milkweeds and nectar-producing plants.
- Engage with city parks and recreation, public works, sustainability, and other relevant staff to identify opportunities to revise and maintain mowing programs and milkweed / native nectar plant planting programs.

- Host or support a native seed or plant sale, giveaway or swap.
- Facilitate or support a milkweed seed collection and propagation effort.

- Display educational signage at monarch gardens and pollinator habitat.
- Add or maintain native milkweed and nectar-producing plants in gardens in the community.

This year 1/8th acre of Monarch habitat was created on Hourglass Lake within Lake Crago Park. This is a drier, steeper habitat in which *Asclepias tuberosa* was established.

Primarily through volunteerism and the various volunteer groups that engage with the City of Lakeland Parks Division every year, which includes Publix Supermarkets, Amazon & the Girl Scouts.

One hundred Publix Supermarket employees volunteered on April 4th, 2024 to restore a lake bank at Crago Park and to plant *Asclepias incarnata* and *Asclepias perennis* at the Lake Crago Monarch Butterfly Habitat.

The Parks Division staff at Lake Crago Park (3 employees) have agreed to the once per year mowing schedule. This includes the Grounds Maintenance III, Grounds Maintenance II, and Grounds Maintenance I personnel.

**Please describe the extent of engagement with these groups and revisions/maintenance implemented for mowing or planting programs.**

The new 'once per year' mowing schedule commenced in February of 2024. From this point on, the Lake Crago Monarch Habitat will be bushhogged every February, as opposed to 4 times per year. Thus far the Asclepias species have been unaffected by the yearly mowing. The planting programs are accomplished by volunteers and the City of Lakeland Landscape Crew (4 employees). Plantings take place 2 to 3 times per year.

We collect seeds from established milkweeds and nectar plants at the Lake Crago Monarch Habitat yearly, although just a handful of seeds were collected this year due to hurricanes and inundation. The seeds are sown & transplanted into 4" pots at the City of Lakeland Nursery for installation throughout the year.

The southern Shoreline of Hourglass Lake was restored with native Florida trees and shrubs. This included *Asclepias tuberosa*, *Cephalanthus occidentalis*, *Symphotrichum*

carolinianum, etc. The area will be maintained throughout the year by the Crago maintenance crew. There will be yearly additional plantings and seed collection.

**What community organizations, groups, or leaders (if any) did you partner with or engage to complete this effort?**

We worked with the Lakeland City Commission and City of Lakeland Community Development Division to update the plant selection guide within the City of Lakeland Land Development Code ( [https://library.municode.com/fl/lakeland/codes/land\\_development\\_code?nodeId=LADECO\\_ART4GESIDEST\\_4.5LATRBU](https://library.municode.com/fl/lakeland/codes/land_development_code?nodeId=LADECO_ART4GESIDEST_4.5LATRBU) ). This allowed us to remove invasive species and add additional native plants. We also, previously, were able to install "Supplemental Florida Monarch Butterfly Attracting Plants" at the bottom of the listing. This required a vote from the City Commission for adjustment. It is now available for commercial businesses and subdivisions for consideration in their landscape plans. As for actual plantings by the Parks Division, our landscape crew planted 270 native plants last year. This year the total was 1114 - a difference of 884 additional native plants.

However, on November 21st of this year, I was able to give a presentation to three elementary classes at Clem Churchwell Elementary School for the Great American Teach In. The presentation was about the City of Lakeland's Butterfly Gardening efforts and why we do it. The National Wildlife Federation & The Mayor's Monarch Pledge were a portion of the presentation.

One hundred Publix Supermarket employees volunteered on April 4th, 2024 to restore a lake bank at Crago Park and to plant *Asclepias incarnata* and *Asclepias perennis* at the Lake Crago Monarch Butterfly Habitat.

**How many plants were planted?**

852

**Please describe your effort in completing this action.**

We worked with 100 Publix volunteers to restore the Hourglass lake bank at Lake Crago Park. We broke the 100 volunteers up into groups of 10. Of the 852 native species that were planted by the volunteers on April 4th, 132 plants were specific to Monarch Butterflies, either being a host plant or a nectar plant. Instruction on proper planting techniques and the purpose for this project were given by City of Lakeland Parks Division and COL Public Works Lakes Division staff. The lake bank restoration and butterfly garden were water with the Parks division water-truck until rainy season (mid-June).
