Pledge Summary

The City of Richland Hills is a smallish community in the middle of the Dallas - Ft. Worth Metroplex in North Texas. While our 8,600 count population is dwarfed by most of the cities in our immediate area, Richland Hills has a large appetite to promote nature, champion sustainability, and choose conservation whenever possible. Our city is located in both the fall and spring migration routes for monarchs. Therefore, both our elected officials and staff pledge to support migrating Monarchs by establishing and maintaining wildlife areas that support their conservation. Additionally, we will offer programs and education to make sure that our community knows how important pollinator, specifically monarch, conservation is for the future.

Action Items Committed for 2024

Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Engage with city parks and recreation, public works, sustainability, and other relevant staff to identify opportunities to revise and maintain mowing programs and milkweed / native nectar plant planting programs.
- Engage with gardening leaders and partners (e.g., Master Naturalists, Master Gardeners, Nature Centers, Native Plant Society Chapters , other long-standing and influential community leaders) to support monarch butterfly conservation.
- Create a community art project to enhance and promote monarch and pollinator conservation as well as cultural awareness and recognition.
