Action Items Committed for 2024

Program and Demonstration Gardens

The City of New Braunfels is committed to conservation, and as the City and surrounding areas rapidly increase in population, we want to take an active role not only in protecting, enhancing, and creating Monarch and other pollinator habitat; but also in educating the public about the importance of these things, and how we can balance people's needs with nature's needs.

No additional acres were created this year; however, we actively maintain monarch waystations and pollinator gardens around the city.

We ensure our events are accessible (financially and physically) to low-income members of our community. Our annual Monarch Festival is free, as are our monthly Garden Volunteer Days. Our Monarch Butterfly Tagging class is also free. In addition, for our Title 1 field trips, we charge only 50% of the cost per student, as our non-Title 1 field trips.

As Fischer Park Supervisors and Stewards, we are eager to maintain and strengthen the park's commitment to conservation, including restoration of the Blackland Prairie. We are excited to work with fellow City employees and a Wildlife Biologist to create and implement a comprehensive Natural Resource Management Plan, that will guide all our park efforts for the future.

Please describe the extent of revisions or maintenance to invasive species removal programs, as well as the practices or techniques used to remove the invasive plants.

At Fischer Park, we are currently working with a local Wildlife Biologist to create a comprehensive Natural Resource Management Plan that will guide all of our future park activities, including our ongoing Blackland Prairie restoration. In August of 2024, many exotic tree species (e.g. Chinese Tallow, Chinaberry, and Privet) were removed along the Fischer Park dam in compliance with regulations from the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ). In these areas where trees were removed, we are replanting with a mixture of native seeds, including forbes and grasses. These plants will restore the riparian habitat and provide bank stabilization, but their growth will still be in compliance with the maximum stem/trunk diameter required by TCEQ.

We have held this Festival each fall since Fischer Park opened in 2015, but this was by far the largest and most successful.

During our annual Monarch Fall Festival, we partnered with multiple conservation groups to educate the public about the importance of native plants to Monarchs and other pollinators. The City posts educational content about the importance of native plants and pollinators on our social media page as well. Our monthly Garden Volunteer Day gives the community a chance to help maintain our Monarch Waystation, and encourages residents to plant monarch gardens and other pollinator gardens. Interpretive signage about pollinators, Monarch butterflies, and native plants are in place at Fischer Park and along Fredericksburg Road (near Landa Park), and signage has been installed in the Landa Family Garden.

Our monthly Garden Volunteer Day gives the community a chance to help maintain our Monarch Waystation, and encourages residents to plant monarch gardens and other pollinator gardens. Our monthly Garden Volunteer Day is free and open to the public, and for most of the months of 2024, was co-led by 1-2 Volunteers from the Guadalupe Chapter of the Texas Master Naturalist Program. During our Monarch Festival in 2024, multiple Master Naturalists, Native Plant Society members, and other volunteers led educational stations and talked to families about the importance of native plants, monarch butterflies, and more.

City staff and volunteers maintain pollinator gardens in Fischer Park Monarch Waystation and Landa Family Garden. In addition, volunteers maintain a garden at the historic Lindheimer Haus that includes a variety of pollinator plants. Fischer Park Nature Education Center staff work with children during their field trips to the park, to create seedballs and distribute them in the Fischer Park Blackland Prairie. It's difficult to estimate the number of new milkweed or nectar-producing plants planted by these seedballs, but this year we had 324 children distribute seedballs in our Blackland Prairie. The seedballs are made with a Blackland Prairie seed mix, which includes a mix of native grasses as well as nectar-producing plants. We can safely say that thousands of nectar-producing plants were distributed in our Blackland Prairie this year. In addition, 158 milkweed plugs were planted by Guadalupe Chapter Texas Master Naturalist volunteers, at the Fischer Park Butterfly Garden.
