We use the Mayors' Monarch Pledge to engage marginalized communities by prioritizing habitat projects in low-income neighborhoods and communities of color and partnering with trusted local organizations, schools, and community leaders. By placing pollinator gardens in accessible public spaces and providing free or low-cost plants, materials, and multilingual education, we reduce barriers to participation.

What was your community's motivation for taking and continuing to work on the Mayors' Monarch Pledge?

Our community was motivated to take the Mayors' Monarch Pledge to address the decline of pollinators while simultaneously creating greener, healthier, and more resilient neighborhoods.

What resources have been most helpful to you thus far and what new resources would you like to see to help meet your goals? What resources would be useful to help expand equitable engagement in community processes and access to high-quality, usable nature?

Thus far, the most helpful resources have been technical guidance on creating and maintaining monarch habitats, access to native plants and seeds, educational materials, and opportunities for networking with other cities and community organizations engaged in the Pledge. These resources have enabled us to build visible, sustainable pollinator spaces and engage residents in hands-on conservation.

What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?

Over the past year, our monarch butterfly conservation efforts have focused not only on habitat creation but also on community engagement and education. We have installed pollinator gardens and native plantings in public spaces.

Selected Action Items

We launched and maintained a targeted public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes and in neighborhood spaces. This effort included educational outreach through social media, the city website, newsletters, and local events to raise awareness about monarch habitat loss and the importance of native milkweed and nectar plants. We provided simple, accessible resources—such as planting guides, recommended native species lists, and garden signage—to reduce barriers to participation. The Murrieta Seed Library program was highlighted as a free community resource designed to promote native plants and support residents in establishing monarch-friendly gardens. Partnerships with schools, community groups, garden clubs, and neighborhood associations helped expand reach and sustain engagement. By highlighting success stories and seasonal planting opportunities, this ongoing communication effort fostered community pride, increased pollinator-friendly landscapes, and supported long-term monarch conservation.

How many plants were sold and/or given away at your event?

The library is home to our seed library, where anyone is welcome to come in and take seeds to plant at their home. Many community members frequently visit the library specifically to utilize this service, making it a natural and accessible location for a native seed giveaway. Supporting this initiative aligns perfectly with our mission to promote sustainability, learning, and community engagement.

The demonstration garden is located just outside the Murrieta Library. This location is significant because it places the garden in a highly visible, community-centered space where visitors can learn about California native plants and pollinators. As a California native plant pollinator garden, it highlights the monarch butterfly's cultural and ecological importance in the region, emphasizing California's role as critical habitat for monarch migration, breeding, and overwintering.

The Murrieta Public Library has partnered with the California State Library and the Western Municipal Water District to create a California native plant pollinator garden to grow alongside our Seed Library.
