## Pledge Summary

The City of Rolling Meadows is a city roughly 20 miles Northwest of Chicago, IL with a population of approximately 25,000 residents. The city has an abundance of parks and public space. In addition to its public spaces and parks, there are community gardens. These community gardens are plots of green space where residents can grow produce and flowers. The City of Rolling Meadows, Illinois has committed to saving the monarch butterfly and other pollinators with the signing of the Mayors' pledge and look forward to encouraging residents to plant more native plants and flowers giving our indigenous pollinators more to feed on.

## Action Items Committed for 2023

### Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Engage with community garden groups and urge them to plant native milkweeds and nectar-producing plants.
- Engage with city parks and recreation, public works, sustainability, and other relevant staff to identify opportunities to revise and maintain mowing programs and milkweed / native nectar plant planting programs.
- Engage with gardening leaders and partners (e.g., Master Naturalists, Master Gardeners, Nature Centers, Native Plant Society Chapters, other long-standing and influential community leaders) to support monarch butterfly conservation.

### Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Plant or maintain a monarch and pollinator-friendly demonstration garden at City Hall or another prominent or culturally significant community location.
- Plant milkweed and pollinator-friendly native nectar plants along roadsides, medians, or public rights-of-way.
- Display educational signage at monarch gardens and pollinator habitat.

### Systems Change

- Increase the percentage of native plants, shrubs and trees that must be used in city landscaping ordinances and encourage use of milkweed, where appropriate.
- Reduce or eliminate the use of herbicides, pesticides, or other chemicals that are harmful to monarchs and pollinators and urban wildlife.

See attached draft rendering and sign specification details. These informational signs highlight the importance of the monarch butterfly and milkweed in their habitations. The signs are being installed as part of the 2023 Park Street Storm Sewer project, which includes bioswale installations that transect a key residential neighborhood, shopping center, school, playfields, park, and Salt Creek (an important waterway).

At the City Council's next meeting, the City will adopt a new Sustainability Plan that includes Action L-7, "Rolling Meadows will raise community awareness of native and sustainable landscaping," as well as Action L-8, "Rolling Meadows will create native and sustainable landscaping through municipal projects, with a special focus on gateways and business districts." The Plan calls on community groups to participate in implementation, and outreach work will begin in 2024 after adoption of the Plan. In the interim, the City's primary gardening group is dedicated to prairie restoration including native planting of

plants that support monarch populations. The pending adoption of the plan was highlighted on the front page of the December 7, 2023 Daily Herald, a major newspaper for Chicago suburbs. Individual members of these groups - primarily those who have worked on the City's two prairie restoration sites - sit on or attend meetings of the City's Environmental Committee, who was responsible for writing, reviewing, and recommending approval of the Plan to the City Council.
