Pledge Summary

Elm Grove is a village of just 3.29 square miles (6,524 in population) that was incorporated in 1955. The community was named America's best suburb by Business Insider in 2014 and proudly became the first community in the state of Wisconsin to achieve the National Wildlife Federation's Community Habitat designation on 1/27/23. The community takes pride in its Tree City USA, Bird City Wisconsin High Flyer, and Bee City USA designations. Our small community has 8 certified Monarch Waystations via the Monarch Watch, one of which is at our 79 acre village park, which was named in Rob Bignell's book, Wisconsin's Best Wildflower Hikes. Our community has been dedicated to increasing awareness about the plight of the monarch butterfly through ongoing community education and outreach programs including native plant sales, village displays, native plant gardens, book clubs, and monarch activist speakers. Elm Grove is proud to add the Mayors' Monarch Pledge to its list of important commitments.

Action Items Committed for 2023

Our community is a small 3.28 square mile village on the border of Milwaukee and Waukesha county. Given our proximity to the Milwaukee County Monarch Trail, we have had a close association with the Friends of the Monarch Trail. Once we were made aware of the Mayors' Monarch Pledge through our association with the Community Wildlife Habitat, it became a natural next step. We were not able to accomplish our initial goal of actionable items in 2023, but will be working throughout the winter to take on more action items in 2024.

What resources have been most helpful to you thus far and what new resources would you like to see to help meet your goals? What resources would be useful to help expand equitable engagement in community processes and access to high-quality, usable nature?

What would be the most helpful would be sample ordinances for light pollution--with different levels of wording for communities taking just the first step versus those willing to take a look at revising what they currently have to make it more complete or detailed.

What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?

This may not be something you want to include in your synopsis, but we were working to get all 24 actions completed. When we discovered how much education and outreach was still needed to increase awareness for the plight of monarchs (and other invertebrates), we decided that it would be best if we just slowed down to focus on what we had accomplished and obtain the Monarch Leadership Circle in 2023. Our thoughts were that the publicity of that would increase awareness within our community and hopefully help propel more people to engage in our efforts and help us achieve the 2024 goal to become a Monarch Champion.

On March 15th, 2023 our community welcomed Barb Agnew the president of Wauwatosa's Monarch Trail to speak on Monarch Conservation. The lecture was very well received and attended. The lecture was recorded and will be placed on our community's website to view by those not in attendance. We also have a quarterly newsletter published that focuses on increasing awareness and engagement in our mission to protect our ecosystem and biodiversity. The newsletter is shared electronically with members subscribed, available on our village website, and printed for distribution at our village hall and all events. Additionally, we have a specific Elm Grove Community Wildlife Habitat group that we share information about our mission to. Our Monarch Milkweed Map (see below) is also key to much of our public communication in increasing support for monarch needs.

The village of Elm Grove engaged with the Elm Grove Beautification Committee to plant and maintain 2 Monarch Waystations and one rain garden that includes all native plants, including milkweed. With their native plant sale this year, they offered a free milkweed plant with \$10 purchase to encourage the support of monarchs, selling out before the end of the sale. A total of 180 milkweed plants were distributed on June 3, 2023.

There are 3 demonstration gardens within our 79 acre village park--all planted with native plants, including milkweed. They are all in very prominent locations along the walking paths that encircle our village pond.

We created a Monarch Milkweed Map of our community to increase awareness about the importance of milkweed to the support of monarch butterflies. On it, we add an orange dot to any home that grows any of the 12 varieties of milkweed native to our area. Each year, we set a goal for how many additional "dots" we hope to add to the map. We have had

milkweed sales, we offer free milkweed seedlings, and we have a mission statement (included) to our map to help explain the purpose of our project. The goal for 2023 is to have 200 dots on our map (attached), and we've set our 2024 goal at 300 dots on the map.

Starting at the end of March 2023, our community encouraged residents to create and log sightings on Journey North. A flyer was created and distributed via social media platforms and to all of the schools. Updates were made to social media platforms whenever a Journey North report came out and challenges were made for community residents to be the first to report emerging milkweed and/or monarchs. This first attempt was not as well received as we had hoped. Expanding in 2024 to perform butterfly surveys, hands on demonstrations, and partnerships with our recreation department are planned.

Additional swamp milkweed plants were added to the rain garden demonstration bed at our village park near our village hall and police station. Ongoing work with our Veteran's Park (2 acre) restoration was completed. This included weekly Invasive Species task Force meetings to remove invasive plants while educating volunteers. Grant application was accepted from community Junior Guild group for \$500 to get a comprehensive professional landscape plan for invasive species removal and introduction of more diverse native plants. This grant, which was in association with our village administration was widely publicized within the community. The Junior Guild votes on their grant applications, and the Veteran's Park comprehensive plan was a unanimous decision.

A group of community volunteers formed the Invasive Species Task Force (ISTF) August of 2020 and meets every Sunday at 11am for one hour within the village, usually at one of the village parks. An email goes out each Thursday or Friday notifying the group where we will be meeting and what we will be working on. The group has tackled garlic mustard, Dame's rocket, thistle, Queen Anne's lace, teasel, buckthorn, honeysuckle, phragmites, bindweed, and purple loosestrife. There are currently 66 emails that the message goes out to with passersby showing interest and some joining in. The group is gaining momentum throughout the community with more and more people showing up to help remove invasive for one hour each week. The Elm Grove Beautification Committee has purchased 4 Pullerbear tree wrenches that they loan out to homeowners for the removal of buckthorn.

Please describe the community art project that was implemented in your community and how it contributed to cultural awareness and recognition (e.g., number of art installations, type of art).

For the last two years, a live monarch display window was installed in our public library. In 2022 the window was in place for almost one month because it was so popular! Community resident, Jennifer Morris, would tend to the window once or twice a day the entire time, engaging with innumerable residents each day. The 10 ft by 5 foot by 2 foot display window had a plethora of information about monarchs, included cut plants of 4 different varieties of milkweed, and had actual eggs, caterpillars in various stages of development, and chrysalides! People came from outside communities to see the display! It was promoted and updated on social media daily. Although we understand that captive rearing is discouraged, there was a large portion of our village that was engaged with this project and learned the importance of monarch conservation through it. We were shocked with the high percentage of people that didn't know monarchs migrated, that milkweed was a host plant, that there was more than one variety of milkweed, and that monarchs needed nectar plants as well.
