## Pledge Summary

Leander is a city in Williamson County and Travis County with a population of approximately 81,800. Leander offers a unique blend of Texas Hill Country living in the urban Austin metropolitan area with scenic landscapes, wildlife and waterways enjoyed by many of our community residents and visitors.

## Action Items Committed for 2023

### Communications and Convening

We have engaged with the Williamson County chapter of the Native Plant Society of Texas to help promote awareness of native plants and the opportunities they provide for both water conservation and sustaining pollinators. These include an emphasis on the monarch. For example, we hosted a speaker at our activities center in October to talk about native plants. We have also had involvement from the Pedernales Electric Cooperative (PEC) and the local Girl Scouts. PEC, which is our electric utility, and the scouts worked with us to seed some park land in wildflowers in the Spring of 2023.

**Please describe the extent of engagement with these groups and their monarch butterfly conservation efforts.**

Our pledge announcement was attended some of our girl scouts who took place in a wildflower seeding in a public park. A PEC representative also was present at the proclamation and the seeding. We are continuing to work with the Native Plant Society to get advice on planting a native gardens which could also supply monarch habitat.

The Public Works Department is developing a map of areas where we can delay mowing until late June to allow for monarch reproduction during the spring migration. This fall we have begun working with Code Enforcement to evaluate opportunities to make room for

wildscaping residential properties so we can encourage more native plantings. This can be problematic because efforts to do this sometimes clash with city code. We are also discussing protection and creation of monarch habitat with our parks staff.

**Please describe the extent of engagement with these groups and revisions/maintenance implemented for mowing or planting programs.**

Meetings with the street superintendent, parks managers, and code. In once case myself and the code enforcement chief met online with a resident who wishes to promote wildscaping in Leander.
