Pledge Summary

Leander is a growing city of about 100,000 residents on the edge of the Texas Hill Country. Given our location in the eastern monarch migration route, we are in a great place to help support the butterfly. Our participation enhances efforts to engage with residents in our work in water conservation and city beautification through promotion of drought tolerant landscaping with native Texas Plants. Many of these plants are also useful to monarchs and other pollinators.

Action Items Committed for 2024

Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. We have been wanting to create a substantial drought-tolerant demonstration garden for some time, and we are developing a solid plan to build one at our new senior center, and also coming up with a maintenance plan. We intend to have this certified as a Monarch Way Station.

How are you leveraging the Mayors' Monarch Pledge program to engage marginalized communities, such as low-income communities or communities of color?

Our program is available to all communities, regardless of ethnicity, through our online presentations and public events.

What was your community's motivation for taking and continuing to work on the Mayors' Monarch Pledge?

The city seeks ways to engage residents in constructive programs, including those related to the environment and water conservation. The Monarch Pledge is something we can do that fits with our water conservation programs through its connection with native landscaping.

What resources have been most helpful to you thus far and what new resources would you like to see to help meet your goals? What resources would be useful to help expand equitable engagement in community processes and access to high-quality, usable nature?

The Monarch Watch and National Wildlife Foundation websites. We often use them as guides for information about the monarch and share those websites with our public whenever possible.

What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?

Public interest in the monarch pledge is quite high. We did a social media post about building a butterfly puddling station that was liked and loved and commented on by a huge number of people. Staff involvement is also growing. Our engineering staff and parks staff are now working on a drought-tolerant plant demonstration at our new senior center now under construction. We plan to have the garden built to fulfill criteria to be marked as a monarch way station.

Social media and the city's online newsletter, Leander Connect were used to spread information about the Monarch Pledge, as well as public presentations by city conservation staff and public speakers we hosted from the Monarch Watch (via Teams) and the Austin Butterfly Forum and the Native Plant Society of Texas, Williamson County Chapter (in-person presentation at the Leander Activities Center).

Public Works is conducting a mowing delay along 2.5 miles of Ronald Reagan Boulevard. Engineering and Parks are working with the Water Conservation Department to develop a drought-tolerant plant demonstration garden slated for construction in late February or March. On the mowing delay, we plan to install permanent road signs stating that the area is under a mowing halt from March to June.

The Austin Butterfly forum collaborated with us in bringing an expert to speak to our residents at the Leander Activities Center in October. We had about 30 people attend. The Hill Country Bloomers, Native Plant Society and Master Gardeners are in discussions with us about how they can support and use our Drought-Tolerant Plant Demonstration Garden. The Native Plant society this month gave a talk, as well, about types of plants people can use here, and the the discussion included support of pollinators and other wildlife.
