Pledge Summary

Leander is a fast-growing city of 100,000 residents on the edge of the Texas Hill Country. We strive to promote attractive surroundings for our residents and promote environmental awareness. This includes the use of landscapes and plants that fit our region, and water conservation, which is an important to us. The Mayor's Monarch pledge is a great program that complements our efforts because it provides an additional way to communicate with residents about native plants and water at the same time. By promoting the support of the monarch and other pollinators for our plants, we also improve the community's appearance.

Action Items Committed for 2025

Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. (If you have community members who speak a language other than English, we encourage you to also communicate in that language; Champion Pledges must communicate in that language.)
- Engage with city parks and recreation, public works, sustainability, and other relevant staff to identify opportunities to revise and maintain mowing programs and milkweed / native nectar plant planting programs.

While we have not added any habitat on city land, we maintain signed mowing delay areas on about nine miles of roadway on Ronald W. Reagan Boulevard, Lakeline Boulevard, and North Bagdad Road.

How are you leveraging the Mayors' Monarch Pledge program to engage marginalized communities, such as low-income communities or communities of color?

Our program is accessible to anyone through free public events and social media.

What was your community's motivation for taking and continuing to work on the Mayors' Monarch Pledge?

This was our third year. We have found it to be popular with our residents and it helps us in water conservation efforts because it gives us a new way talk about converting landscapes to Texas native plants by relating them to pollinators such as the monarch butterfly.

What resources have been most helpful to you thus far and what new resources would you like to see to help meet your goals? What resources would be useful to help expand equitable engagement in community processes and access to high-quality, usable nature?

Monarch Watch national Wildlife Federations websites have been useful. We have printed out materials from these websites for some of our events where we have discussed the monarch pledge. Short video presentations about different topics related to the monarch and which could be accessed through an online link would be great for our residents, as well as the general public you serve.

What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?

Our signed mowing delay areas have attracted some interest from the public and spurred some to take action. One apartment complex for instance, invited me to visit with their staff and residents to talk about the Monarch Pledge. They are starting to work on a monarch garden. We have also built a relationship with Austin Butterfly Forum, a non-profit group that promotes education and activities related to the butterflies. We had a speaker from their group appear at our Activities Center in May, and I recently spoke at one of their organizational meetings about Leander's work with the Monarch Pledge.

Right now we are communicating by email and there has been a brief meeting with myself and the City Manager with another organization which wants to building native plant areas on private property. We hope to build on these in 2025.

This year we met multiple times with a group formed from our local Master Gardeners, the Williamson County Chapter of the Native Plant Society of Texas and a volunteer connected to our County Extension agent on our proposed Native Plant Demonstration Garden. This has been planned for our new senior citizens center now under construction. The project has repeatedly been delayed because of construction delays stemming from changes that had to be made to the building.

We had four one-one-one meetings and significant email and telephone contact with members of these organizations.
