Pledge Summary

Mountain Brook is a city in central Alabama, a picturesque place known for its winding, forested roads and park-like setting; a vision of its original developer Robert Jemison, Jr. and landscape architect Warren H. Manning. Among other "green" initiatives supported by Mayor Welch, he has committed to participate in efforts to save the Monarch Butterfly and support all pollinator habitats by signing the Mayor's Monarch Pledge. He looks forward to engaging the Mountain Brook community in the city's efforts to bolster the pollinator ecosystems of Alabama.

Action Items Committed for 2024

Communications and Convening

- Engage with community garden groups and urge them to plant native milkweeds and nectar-producing plants.
- Engage with gardening leaders and partners (e.g., Master Naturalists, Master Gardeners, Nature Centers, Native Plant Society Chapters, other long-standing and influential community leaders) to support monarch butterfly conservation.

We have hosted speaking engagements with communities of all demographics by invitation to come to their civic groups and garden clubs to speak about the importance of native plants. Plus the city has 42 tabs on our public website (MBee) with resources and information about the importance of native habitats in places of residence and work. Also, we spoke at the American Planning Association annual conference, hosted by Alabama and Mississippi chapters of APA.

What was your community's motivation for taking and continuing to work on the Mayors' Monarch Pledge?

The City of Mountain Brook is a Bee City USA affiliate and is a Certified American Green Zone Alliance city, and the City Council has appointed an Environmental Sustainability

Committee, so becoming part of the Mayor's Monarch Pledge was a natural extension for us.

What resources have been most helpful to you thus far and what new resources would you like to see to help meet your goals? What resources would be useful to help expand equitable engagement in community processes and access to high-quality, usable nature?

We have utilized all kinds of on-line resources from environmental groups. We have appreciated "kits" of helpful advertising images and giveaway ideas from various environmental groups, for special events such as National Pollinator week.

What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?

At our annual Bee City educational event this year we devoted an educational station to monarchs, and we gave away milkweed to those who pledged to install a native garden at their residence.

The city conducted 15 speaking engagements with local and statewide garden clubs: a 45-minute PowerPoint presentation on the importance of native plants, how they differ from introduced plants, and what invasive plants are. Also taught an hour long class at the Birmingham Botanical Gardens and at the Birmingham Public Library on the importance of native plants and native pollinators.

Please describe the maintenance schedule for these planted areas.

Year 1 & 2: After planting, monitor site occasionally to see if any weeds develop. If a problem develops Roundstone can make suggestions once it is determined what is happening. In winter, perhaps mow the area to about 8"-12" high. Year 3 – on: Monitor site for weeds. About every 3 years (not the 3rd year following planting), lightly disturb the soil to keep grasses from dominating. Do this late winter/early spring. It will need to be mowed once a year. If it looks attractive going into the winter, then mow in early spring. If not, mow in late fall.

A local Mountain Brook resident is in the midst of planting native installations (which include milkweed and other native nectar providing forbs) in the traffic islands in a coordinated effort with surrounding residential property owners. He has an outstanding reputation for installing small pop-up gardens in and around Birmingham, but he has now

partnered with a local native plant landscape architect to design and implement these three projects. He has coordinates with the city for a portion of the funding, and is working in partnership with the city's Parks/Rec department for installation and maintenance.

The city prints a paper newsletter (The Reporter) and mails it, quarterly, to all households (7,147) and businesses (175) in the city of Mountain Brook. The planning/sustainability department of the city uses this publication to raise awareness on a variety of sustainability topics. Recent topics include: Don't Tidy the Fall Garden/Leave the Leaves/ Lights out for Fall Migrating Birds/12 Things You Can Do to Support Pollinators in Your Yard/ What is an Invasive Plant? We also utilize social media invite citizens to special events (such as the Native Plant Giveaway) and to promote things like National Pollinator Week activities. The city's website section MBee, AL contains 42 tabs of resources and information about native habitats and pollinator support. There is also a Little Lending Library at the City Hall Pollinator Garden, with books to share about native habitats and pollinators.
