## Pledge Summary

The Mayor, City Council and city staff recognize the importance of the monarch butterfly and pollinators to a well-functioning ecosystem. The city has committed to take meaningful action to protect the monarch butterfly and encourages residents to make a difference by providing habitat for the monarch in locations where they live, work and play.

## Action Items Committed for 2023

### Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. (If you have community members who speak a language other than English, we encourage you to also communicate in that language; Champion Pledges must communicate in that language.)
- Engage with community garden groups and urge them to plant native milkweeds and nectar-producing plants.
- Engage with city parks and recreation, public works, sustainability, and other relevant staff to identify opportunities to revise and maintain mowing programs and milkweed / native nectar plant planting programs.

- Display educational signage at monarch gardens and pollinator habitat.
- Launch, expand, or continue an invasive species removal program that will support the re-establishment of native habitat for monarch butterflies and other pollinators.

Maple Grove recently received a grant to remove invasives and re-establish native prairie and flowers within the town green and around the Arbor Lakes. This work is underway.

As mentioned above, the Maple Grove Arbor Committee was tasked with planning a community pollinator garden. The arbor Committee also manages the city 100+ acres of forest preserve which contains pockets of native native prairie, plants and flowers. Several of the committee members are also Master Gardeners.

The pollinator garden will be located in Maple Grove's Central Park, the city's largest and most visited park. The garden is currently in the planning phase and will be implemented in spring, 2024.

**Please describe the extent of revisions or maintenance to invasive species removal programs, as well as the practices or techniques used to remove the invasive plants.**

For the past 5 years, Maple Grove has actively combatted buckthorn within its Forest Preservation Area. The city was recently awarded a \$50,000 grant from the state of Minnesota continue the treatment of buckthorn on this city-owned public land. The contractor chosen for this work is very conscientious of existing native plants, allowing them to thrive.
