Pledge Summary

The Borough of Eatontown has a population of roughly 13,500, and is located in central New Jersey near the coast. Eatontown has over 100 acres of parkland with two pollinator gardens as well as a very large community garden. Mayor Talerico has committed to saving the monarch butterfly and other pollinators with by signing the Mayor's Monarch Pledge again this year. He looks forward to engaging residents in building more pollinator habitat throughout the Borough.

Action Items Committed for 2024

Communications and Convening

- Engage with city parks and recreation, public works, sustainability, and other relevant staff to identify opportunities to revise and maintain mowing programs and milkweed / native nectar plant planting programs.

Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Plant milkweed and pollinator-friendly native nectar plants along roadsides, medians, or public rights-of-way.
- Add or maintain native milkweed and nectar-producing plants in gardens in the community.
- Launch, expand, or continue an invasive species removal program that will support the re-establishment of native habitat for monarch butterflies and other pollinators.
- Display educational signage at monarch gardens and pollinator habitat.

We have barely scratched the surface. There are patches of parkland that we planted with seeds but we have not seen the milkweed grow there yet. I will start seedlings and physically plant them.

In 2024 we continued our all - volunteer invasive species strike team monthly work parties at our Arboretum. The Arboretum is 47 acres, so we estimate we have covered about 20 acres. Volunteers come out once a month and hand pull, lop, snip and saw invasive plants and vines. We celebrated our 3 year this year. We do not use herbicides or chemicals as we do not have any certification or approval to use them. We have tried to plant some native pollinator plants (mountain mint, bee balm, and wild bergamot) to see if they will establish themselves instead of the garlic mustard that grows there.
