## Pledge Summary

Medford, MA is situated 6 miles north of Boston with close to 60,000 residents. Sitting on 8.6 square miles, Medford has a lot of public green spaces that people come from near and far to enjoy. Mayor Breanna Lungo-Koehn is committed and passionate about the environment and how that impacts the monarch butterfly and bee populations. As an avid gardener, the Mayor has taken the butterfly pledge and plans on landscaping 7 areas of the city that have been designed by an environmental landscaper to plant native pollinators that align with this pledge, and beyond!

## Action Items Committed for 2023

### Communications and Convening

- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. - Engage with community garden groups and urge them to plant native milkweeds and nectar-producing plants.

The City of Medford installed 7 new pollinator gardens in 2023. The City of Medford hired a local environmental landscape architect to design 5, "Gateway Gardens" in front of new, Welcome to Medford signs. These areas are very prominent and the entryways to Medford. The City also installed a garden on the premises of City Hall, in front of the building. In addition to all this, a few neighborhoods adopted public areas near their homes and made them into pollinator gardens! We have had neighboring communities inquire as to what we've done, and how we did it.

We have put the word out. Hopefully the library will help us reach the youth of the lower income and communities of color to participate.

**What was your community's motivation for taking and continuing to work on the Mayors' Monarch Pledge?**

The decline of pollinators and the love of gardening.

**What resources have been most helpful to you thus far and what new resources would you like to see to help meet your goals? What resources would be useful to help expand equitable engagement in community processes and access to high-quality, usable nature?**

This may not be a resource, but I would like to see more talked about for the education and identification of invasives. We also need to be removing those as we are planting pollinators. It's hand in hand.

### **What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?**

The City fulfilled, and exceeded the goals for the sourcing and planting of pollinators for 2023! We look forward to finishing out 2023 with seed collection from the garden (not too many though!) and 2024 planning! The Tufts Pollinator Initiative has great resources on the seed collection process. The City recently acquired a seed library (pic attached) that is being installed on a post at the Medford Public Library near their pollinator garden. Local garden club will be supplying the seeds for the library.
