Pledge Summary

Rogers, established 1881, is located in beautiful Northwest Arkansas. The City of Rogers is approximately 39 square miles with 71,000 residents. The City of Rogers has 400 acres of park land, containing 24 parks, a skate and splash park, 26 athletic fields, and over 70 miles of Greenways and Trails. The City of Rogers is committed to saving the monarch butterfly and other pollinators with the signing of the Mayor's Monarch Pledge. The City of Rogers has partnerships with NWA Master Naturalists and the Garden Club of Rogers to help build and maintain pollinator habitat throughout the city.

Action Items Committed for 2023

Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Engage with community garden groups and urge them to plant native milkweeds and nectar-producing plants.

Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Host or support a native seed or plant sale, giveaway or swap.
- Plant or maintain a monarch and pollinator-friendly demonstration garden at City Hall or another prominent or culturally significant community location.
- Launch, expand, or continue an invasive species removal program that will support the re-establishment of native habitat for monarch butterflies and other pollinators.
- Display educational signage at monarch gardens and pollinator habitat.

The Butterfly Garden is part of our Downtown Railyard Park and we host many free cultural events Downtown that bring low-income and communities of color to this space. The Butterfly Garden and Invasive Removals are open to all members of the public.

What was your community's motivation for taking and continuing to work on the Mayors' Monarch Pledge?

We understand the importance to the ecosystem that butterflies serve. The City has the land and through partnerships we engage groups to help us create more pollinator habitats and educate the general public.

What resources have been most helpful to you thus far and what new resources would you like to see to help meet your goals? What resources would be useful to help expand equitable engagement in community processes and access to high-quality, usable nature?

I would be interested in more resources on how to engage low-income and communities of color in our activities.

What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?

We have not begun restoration work in 2023, but we developed a 5 year restoration and maintenance plan for our Pinnacle Open Space project. This project will restore historic prairie, create wetlands, protect streams, increase our native species, and be an outdoor classroom for all visitors. The restoration area encompasses 27 acres.

Please describe the extent of revisions or maintenance to invasive species removal programs, as well as the practices or techniques used to remove the invasive plants.

We partner with the Beaver Watershed Alliance to host invasive removal clinics at Lake Atalanta Park. We hosted two public invasive removals this spring and one corporate team building invasive removal as well. We show volunteers how to identify invasives like bush honeysuckle, Chinese privet, winter creeper. Then depending on the plant we remove invasive by pulling them by hand (small privet, honeysuckle), a weed wrench (large privet), and cut stump herbicide treatment (privet, winter creeper). Invasives removed are taken by the City to be burned and not mulched.
