## Pledge Summary

The Rogers, Arkansas is in one of the fastest-growing metropolitan areas in the nation. Rogers has a population of 72,112. Nestled in the Ozarks, Rogers is surrounded by natural beauty and outdoor recreation is a large draw for the region. As the region grows, it is important to the City of Rogers to engage in activities that support monarch and other vital pollinator populations.

### Communications and Convening

Beaver Watershed Alliance co-host invasive plant removal work days with Rogers Parks and Recreation.

The City of Rogers owns a 7.21-acre parcel on E New Hope Rd that is home to rose milkweed. We work with Arkansas Natural Heritage Commission to allow seed collection on this property and to work our mowing schedules around seed collection.

1.4 acres typical per event. Lake Atalanta Park is a 236-acre park where we typically host 2-4 invasive removal events per year.

**Please describe the extent of revisions or maintenance to invasive species removal programs, as well as the practices or techniques used to remove the invasive plants.**

Rogers had less invasive removals in 2024 due to tornado recovery efforts. However, the City has invested in more supplies for invasive removals so we can engage more corporate partners looking for volunteer opportunities. Our goal in 2025 is to host 4 invasive removals per year.
