## Pledge Summary

Hot Springs is the most popular tourist destination in the state of Arkansas with nearly 7 million annual visitors. It is located just southwest of the state capital of Arkansas with a population of more than 38,000 residents. As a part of the Natural State, the city of Hot Springs is nestled alongside Hot Springs National Park, also known as the first U.S. National Reservation, as well as the Ouachita National Forest and two state parks. It is surrounded by three man-made lakes, one of which is the largest lake in the state and also consistently ranked one of the cleanest lakes in the nation. In addition to the state/federal attractions, the City of Hot Springs boasts of having 22 parks within and surrounding the city limits, along with the Hot Springs Creek Greenway Trail. Between all these entities, Hot Springs has more than 100 miles of hiking/walking trails. In an effort to bring awareness to pollinators, the City of Hot Springs partners with community groups such as the Master Gardeners and Arkansas Master Naturalists, Diamond Lakes Division (DLAMN) to host a variety of presentations and educational events at pollinator areas on city-owned parks and trails. This includes the popular Monarch Butterfly releases held at the Monarch Butterfly Garden on the Hot Springs Creek Greenway Trail, which was created with the help of DLAMN. By signing the Mayor's Monarch Pledge, Hot Springs Mayor Pat McCabe has committed to continue to save the monarch butterfly and other pollinators and looks forward to engaging residents in pollinator education and building more pollinator habitats throughout the city.

The City of Hot Springs is excited to share that we have four pollinator gardens in different city parks (Entergy Park and David F. Watkins Park) and along paved greenway spaces (Hot Springs Farmer's Market and the Hot Springs Creek Greenway Trail). In addition, there are native plants within rain gardens along numerous city-maintained roads and several vitex plants throughout City property. The City of Hot Springs also has a Landscaping Code that is used to promulgate the health, safety and general welfare of the citizens of the City of Hot Springs National Park through the establishment of reasonable standards for the preservation, planting, and care of natural vegetation and introduced landscaping.

**How are you leveraging the Mayors' Monarch Pledge program to engage marginalized communities, such as low-income communities or communities of color?**

The City of Hot Springs is creating rain gardens and pollinator gardens within low-income areas and within the minority districts. By doing this, the areas are used as free educational demonstrations, and volunteer opportunities, drawing tourists to the areas, and providing avenues for exercise.

**What was your community's motivation for taking and continuing to work on the Mayors' Monarch Pledge?**

The City of Hot Springs has already been participating in efforts to protect pollinators over the past ten years. We always want to increase our planting of pollinator-native plants along trailsides, roadways and other public areas.

**What resources have been most helpful to you thus far and what new resources would you like to see to help meet your goals? What resources would be useful to help expand equitable engagement in community processes and access to high-quality, usable nature?**

The City of Hot Springs Parks and Trails Department actively uses the extensive knowledge of the individuals through the Master Gardeners, Diamond Lake Arkansas Master Naturalists (DLAMN) and the University of Arkansas Agriculture Division. The City of Hot Springs Parks and Trails Director states that he would like to see more community involvement, including different community organizations through public schools, the public library and other volunteer groups.

**What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?**

Over the last year, the City's main focus has been adding public rights-of-way, medians, and rain gardens. The City of Hot Springs Parks and Trails Department has plans, for some of our City Parks, to plant native wildflower fields in the open greenspaces within specific City parks. In 2024, the Parks and Trails Department is hoping to have native wildlife fields in at least two of the City parks. Also, towards the beginning of 2024, the Parks and Trails Department plans to expand the Hot Springs Creek Greenway Trail Monarch Butterfly Garden.

The City of Hot Springs Department of Parks and Trails and the Diamond Lakes Arkansas Master Naturalists (DLAMN) presented a Monarch Butterfly Mania. Through combined efforts, a guided walk along the Hot Springs Creek Greenway Trail, a Monarch butterfly program and butterfly release occurred on Saturday, October 7. The public was invited to join the activities presented and led by DLAMN Certified Master Naturalists. Participants gathered before the 9:30 departure for the Guided Walk along the Hot Springs Creek Greenway Trail. The walk began where the Greenway Trail crosses Orange Street near the Farmers Market. The distance to the Butterfly Garden is 0.75 miles. The total distance of the round-trip walk was 1.5 miles along a smooth, paved surface. Along the way, attendees will be introduced to the rich plant diversity of one of Hot Springs's many parks. A program on the Butterfly Garden, Pollinators, and the Release of Monarch Butterflies was given by Certified Master Naturalists Karen Hicks and Loretta West at the Butterfly Garden located at the junction of the Greenway Trail and Runyon St. Those not wanting to make the walk were able to drive to the Butterfly Garden. Parking is available at the intersection of Valley and Runyan streets. The program started at approximately 10:00 a.m. Hicks and West explained that Monarch Butterflies are pollinators, just like bees, wasps, flies and birds. They also explained that more than 35% of the foods we eat depend on pollinators, as do livestock. The program included how the Monarch Butterfly is our only North American butterfly that migrates each fall and spring; a journey of 1200 to 2600 miles. The butterflies released began their fall journey to Mexico where they will overwinter in the Trans Volcanic Mountains. Each spring the migratory adults return to North America from their overwintering grounds. The program will explain the different generations of Monarchs and their life spans. More than 100 Generation 4 Monarch butterflies were released at the event.

The City of Hot Springs' main demonstration pollinator garden is located alongside the Hot Springs Creek and Hot Springs Creek Greenway Trail, near the corner of Valley and Runyon streets. It's accessible by a paved path within our minority district and borders the historic district of Hot Springs. This space is on the edge of an open field and wooded area adjacent to a flowing creek.

The City of Hot Springs partners with five (5) community organizations and groups: The Garland County Master Gardeners, the Diamond Lakes Arkansas Master Naturalists, the Garland County Conservation District, Downtown Hot Springs Rotary Club and Tri-Lakes Ornamental Iron Works and artist Laura Bluewaters.

**Please describe the extent of engagement with these groups and their monarch butterfly conservation efforts.**

The Garland County Master Gardeners maintain a Pollinator Garden at Entergy Park, 530 Lakepark Drive and a Pollinator and Rock Garden at the Hot Springs Farmer's Market, 121 Orange Street, a Xeriscape Garden at a local park and a small Sculpture Garden section of the Hot Springs Greenway Trail. In addition, twice a month, the Master Gardeners help the Parks and Trails Department at its greenhouses. As well as, every Spring, Master Gardener volunteers help create over 130 hanging flower beds to be placed in Downtown Hot Springs along the roadways. DLAMN maintains a Monarch Butterfly Garden along the Hot Springs Creek Greenway Trail. The City of Hot Springs Parks and Trails Department partners with DLAMN to host annual Monarch Butterfly releases and educational experiences at the Hot Springs Creek Greenway Trail Butterfly Garden. In addition, representatives from DLAMN and several other organizations participated in the City of Hot Springs Parks and Trails Department's Arbor Day event, hosted on April 21, 2023, at Entergy Park. This annual event is geared toward local students in the fifth grade. This year, there were approximately 250 students in attendance. The DLAMN representatives had one of the eight learning stations that the students would visit. The DLAMN station showcased their group and what they do, including displaying a butterfly's lifecycle, and migration patterns and teaching the students about the importance of pollinators. The Garland County Conservation District (GCCD) received a grant through the Arkansas Department of Agriculture Natural Resource Division to create pollinator gardens and wildlife habitats. Through this grant, GCCD added native plants to a flowerbed at Entergy Park to create a pollinator garden and supplied native plants to the pollinator garden at the Hot Springs Farmer's Market. The Downtown Hot Springs Rotary Club participates in an annual planting of flowerbeds at one of our trailheads along the Hot Springs Creek Greenway Trail. Tri-Lakes Iron Works and artist Laura Bluewaters created custom metal monarch butterflies to be placed within the Entergy Park Pollinator Garden and in the Hot Springs Creek Greenway Monarch Butterfly Garden. These wrought iron statues weigh approximately 100 pounds and are 7 feet wide and rest upon a 12 to 15-foot stand. In

addition to the metal butterflies, Tri-Lakes also donated a custom Monarch Bench at the Hot Springs Creek Greenway Monarch Butterfly Garden.
