Our community's involvement in activities and education to support our pollinators has been an ongoing effort since incorporation. We have a large number of residents, committees, staff members, elected officials and sister government agencies that have played a large role in these efforts.

The Environment Committee has an annual Community and Nature in Harmony Award to recognize individuals, business', groups, or community organizations, who through the creation of wildlife habitat or preservation, restoration, and/or beautification of land within the Village of Homer Glen, has demonstrated a commitment to the environment and, in the process, significantly contributed to community pride. Often times, we see our winners maintain their own pollinator habitats. These award have been presented since 2003. The Village of Homer Glen paired with the Homer Glen Junior Womens Club again this year to purchase and distribute milkweed seed packets to residents at our annual Kite Festival. We have also pushed out photos and information on the pollinators seen in our community gardens to encourage people to explore our parks and consider planting their own habitats.

Jennifer Vittori and our Parks staff does an amazing job at maintaining our community gardens, Heritage Park 319 Grant Area, and native sensory garden where we have an abundance of milkweed and other native plantings to support our pollinators. We also hosted a seed planting event in the Spring to get our community planting beds going with milkweeds, other flowers and a large variety of herbs. Jennifer Vittori applied for the free plants from the Garden for Wildlife and is coordinating plant delivery and plantings now that we have been award the free plants.
