## Pledge Summary

The City of Florence is located in Boone County, Kentucky. With roughly 32,000 residents, we are one of the fastest-growing communities in Northern Kentucky. We have 5 neighborhood parks, a Nature Park and several green spaces around the City. Mayor Aubuchon is committed to the restoration of monarch butterfly habitat in our community.

## Action Items Committed for 2023

### Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Engage with Homeowners Associations (HOAs), Community Associations or neighborhood organizations to identify opportunities to plant monarch gardens and revise maintenance and mowing programs.

We gave away milkweed seed packets to residents. They were instructed to plant the seeds in their existing gardens or containers if they did not have the space.

All of the events where we hosted milkweed seed giveaways were free to the public. We always promote the events on our website and message boards around the City. The three events were held in different locations in order to serve all the areas of our community.

**What was your community's motivation for taking and continuing to work on the Mayors' Monarch Pledge?**

The City of Florence is interested in engaging with the community on topics that are important to them. The Mayors' Monarch Pledge is a national cause that has local implications. We are proud of our native environment in Kentucky and we work hard to protect it. The City thought the Mayors' Monarch Pledge would be a good opportunity to reach out to residents about these environmental matters. Our Urban Forestry Commission headed up these efforts since they are familiar with our native plants.

**What resources have been most helpful to you thus far and what new resources would you like to see to help meet your goals? What resources would be useful to help expand equitable engagement in community processes and access to high-quality, usable nature?**

The reporting information was very helpful since this year was our first time pledging. It would be helpful to see more information available that we could put on posters and signage. We don't want to copy directly from someone else's work so some general information we can use would be great. We were also worried about putting incorrect information on signage.

**What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?**

Our Urban Forest Commission is looking to expand our efforts next year with the creation of monarch gardens on City property as well as examining our maintenance practices City-wide.

**Please describe the extent of engagement with these groups and revisions implemented for mowing and maintenance programs.**

The Mayor contacted representatives from several HOAs to see if they were interested in creating or promoting monarch gardens. We sent out our Monarch Garden Guide to those HOAs that were interested. We also reached out and invited them to our Arbor Day event. We planted trees and gave away milkweed seeds and native plants.
