We have 6 active parks, a Nature Park and several green spaces around the City. Mayor Aubuchon is committed to the restoration of monarch butterfly habitat in our community.

The City passed out milkweed seed packets to residents at four different events this year. Residents were instructed to plant the seeds in their gardens or even in containers if they did not have space for new plants.

Milkweed seed packets were given out at four different community events around the City. They were held in different areas as to serve all residents in our community. The events are promoted online and on message boards around the City. Events were held both during the week and over the weekend. Our park master plan public surveys were online so to better reach folks throughout the area.

What was your community's motivation for taking and continuing to work on the Mayors' Monarch Pledge?

The City of Florence chose to continue our work on the Mayors' Monarch Pledge for a second year because it is important to our community. The residents we have interacted with this year were eager and engaged with their environment. Mayors' Monarch Pledge remains an excellent opportunity to reach out to residents about these environmental matters. The Urban Forestry Commission continues to be involved with these efforts as well to promote native trees.

What resources have been most helpful to you thus far and what new resources would you like to see to help meet your goals? What resources would be useful to help expand equitable engagement in community processes and access to high-quality, usable nature?

It would be helpful to see more information available that we could put on posters and signage. We don't want to copy directly from someone else's work so some general information we can use would be great.

The City of Florence is continuing to integrate pollinator friendly practices into our plans and policies. We are master planning our parks and have taken those practices into consideration.
