The City of Florence is located in Boone County, Kentucky. With roughly 32,000 residents, we are one of the fastest-growing communities in Northern Kentucky. We have 5 neighborhood parks, a Nature Park and several green spaces around the City. Mayor Aubuchon is committed to the restoration of monarch butterfly habitat in our community.

The City of Florence distributed milkweed seed packets to residents at 3 different events this year. Residents planted the seeds in their gardens or in containers if they did not have space for new plants. We also gave away milkweed plants and other native flowers plants at our Arbor Day event.

Our giveaway events are held in different areas of the city each year. All our events are free to the public. We advertise the events on message boards and our website. We try to give away other items as well. We host different organizations and companies that can reach the public at these events.

**What was your community's motivation for taking and continuing to work on the Mayors' Monarch Pledge?**

The City of Florence has chosen to continue our work with the Mayors' Monarch Pledge because it remains important to our community and environment. Our Urban Forest Commission enjoys interacting with the public on topics of native plants that help our overall tree canopy. These topics include helping our monarchs find habitat as they migrate each year.

**What resources have been most helpful to you thus far and what new resources would you like to see to help meet your goals? What resources would be useful to help expand equitable engagement in community processes and access to high-quality, usable nature?**

It would be helpful to see more information available that we could put on posters and signage. We don't want to copy directly from someone else's work so some general

information we can use would be great. We were also worried about putting incorrect or copyrighted information on signage.

**What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?**

Our Park Master Plan was finished earlier this year and we beginning to implement changes. Several of our park plans have the addition of native meadows and grasses. The City of Florence is continuing to integrate pollinator-friendly practices into our plans and policies.
