## Pledge Summary

Oak Park is a thriving community of about 54,500 people located immediately west of the City of Chicago and known for its architectural heritage and diverse population. Within its 4.5 square miles live one of the region's most diverse mixes of cultures, races, ethnicities, professions, lifestyles, religions, ages and incomes. Our community climate action, resiliency, and sustainability plan, Climate Ready Oak Park, commits to enhancing or protecting thirty percent of our community land for biodiversity.

## Action Items Committed for 2024

### Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. - Host or support a native seed or plant sale, giveaway or swap.

The guide with examples of how communities can achieve various actions was helpful, and it sparked some ideas.

**What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?**

Our projects this year related to the Mayor's Monarch Pledge included a Monarch Butterfly Month proclamation, communications about National Pollinator Week and a bioblitz, maintenance of an existing rain garden, and completion of a nighttime light environment assessment. The Village also provided \$5,000 total towards a 75% discount to Oak Park residents who purchased monarch garden and rain garden kits through the West Cook Wild Ones Native Plant Sale. The sale supported 150 Oak Park households. The amount of monarch habitat created is estimated based on the number of garden kits (15 plants each) that the Village supported. The number of youth reached through the Mayors' Monarch Pledge is unknown.

The Village hired Ken Walczak, an Adler Planetarium Senior Manager, DarkSky International Board Member, and IES Associate Member to complete an assessment of the nighttime light environment in Oak Park. He presented his findings to the Village's Environment & Energy Commission, which is made up of 9 volunteer residents.
