Pledge Summary

The Village of Oak Park is doing its part to help save the monarch butterfly, an iconic North American species whose populations have declined dramatically in recent years. Village officials have joined hundreds of communities across the country in a pledge to create a healthy habitat that will aid monarch butterflies on their annual migration across the continent. In addition to issuing a proclamation to raise awareness of the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat, the Village plants native milkweed and nectar plants on public properties when appropriate across the community, including traffic diverters, cul-de-sacs, medians and planters. The Village's Public Works Center is also home to a certified Monarch butterfly waystation. According to the National Wildlife Federation, monarch butterflies numbered around 1 billion in 1996. Today, their numbers have declined significantly as a result of numerous threats, particularly the loss of habitat due to cropland conversion, urban development, and agricultural practices.

Action Items Committed for 2025

Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.

Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Host or support a native seed or plant sale, giveaway or swap.

Systems Change

- Change weed or mowing ordinances to allow for native prairie and plant habitats.
- Increase the percentage of native plants, shrubs and trees that must be used in city landscaping ordinances and encourage use of milkweed, where appropriate.

Sample programming and educational/promotional materials for bioblitz events would be helpful as we hope to expand youth engagement opportunities.

What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?

The Village provided \$5,000 total towards a \$20 discount for Oak Park residents who purchased native plants and monarch garden kits through the West Cook Wild Ones Native Plant Sale. The sale supported 244 Oak Park households. The amount of monarch habitat created is estimated based on the number of plants sold (636) that the Village supported. The amount of additional Monarch habitat created is likely higher due to passage of the parkway ordinance allowing and encouraging the installation of native gardens on our parkways. We also manage a rain garden grant and reimbursement program called Rainscapes that, despite not being included originally as part of the pledge, has helped expand native pollinator habitat, particularly for low-income households. The number of youth reached through the Mayors' Monarch Pledge is unknown.
