Pledge Summary

Grand Forks, ND, is located on the Minnesota border, across from its sister city of East Grand Forks, MN. The city was named for its location at the fork of the Red and Red Lake Rivers. Grand Forks boasts a population of 59,166. Combined with its twin city of East Grand Forks, Minnesota, it forms the center of the Grand Forks, ND-MN Metropolitan Statistical Area, often called Greater Grand Forks. Over the past five years, several agencies have embraced the opportunity to provide wildflower and pollinator gardens throughout the community. The city of Grand Forks has built partnerships with Audubon Midwest, the University of ND, and GF Park District to establish restoration projects along the English Coulee.

Communications and Convening

Coming from an agricultural community, we felt a responsibility to educate residents on the importance of pollinators and how to support them.

What resources have been most helpful to you thus far and what new resources would you like to see to help meet your goals? What resources would be useful to help expand equitable engagement in community processes and access to high-quality, usable nature?

Assembling a community task force for this project has been the most helpful resource. Communication on pollinator-friendly projects helps us track our progress. More access to grants could help expand equitable engagement in community processes. Due to the amount of work equitable engagement entails, staffing limitations also weakens our ability to expand within this community.

What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?

Due to our late registration, the status of our program is still in the initial stages of planning and organizing. We are hoping increased resources and information in spring of 2024 will help expand pollinator gardens in our city.

Please describe the extent of engagement with these groups and revisions/maintenance implemented for mowing or planting programs.

The Public Works Department actively lessened the mowing in native grassland areas such as the Greenway and the English Coulee. This included mowing grassland perimeters less to gradually promote the growth of native plants outwards towards paved trails. The English Coulee Restoration Project is also in progress, which assists in the development of native species along the coulee in order to promote pollinator growth and stormwater health. The Grand Forks Park District are continuously developing pollinator-friendly gardens as a part of their planting program. This includes pollinator garden expansion in Sertoma Park and University Park. In total, they have developed almost 4,000 square feet in pollinator friendly gardens. Engagement with groups involved included open forms of communication to discuss the goals and expectations for the 2023 summer and fall seasons as well as their progress reports.

Like many communities across the United States, the City of Grand Forks has had a long-standing ordinance to regulate grass length within the community. This ordinance was developed to provide uniformity- and prevent potential health and safety concerns associated with un-kept vegetation. This ordinance addressed only typical turf grasses and did not allow native plantings. That has since changed to allow ornamental grasses and native flowers to be planted in defined areas, including berms and public right of way.

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
