## Pledge Summary

New Trier Township's mission is to provide leadership, advocacy, and resources to benefit the physical, mental, and social well-being of residents. Established in 1850, New Trier Township government serves more than 60,000 residents in the villages of Glencoe, Kenilworth, Wilmette and Winnetka, plus portions of Glenview and Northfield east of Harms Road and Northfield Road. In June 2023, the Board of Trustees voted to adopt the Mayor's Monarch Pledge in recognition that one of the Township's earliest roles, addressing "noxious weeds," may have contributed to a misunderstanding of the importance of native plants to our pollinators and greater ecosystem.

## Action Items Committed for 2023

### Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Engage with community garden groups and urge them to plant native milkweeds and nectar-producing plants.
- Create a community art project to enhance and promote monarch and pollinator conservation as well as cultural awareness and recognition.

### Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Host or support a native seed or plant sale, giveaway or swap.

One of the mandates of New Trier Township is to use tax dollars to help fund agencies that serve Township residents. One such agency which provides vocational, educational, advocacy, and inclusion programs for persons with disabilities is Our Place of New Trier (Township). As part of some of their programming, participants learned about monarchs and other pollinators, including their importance in the vibrancy and health of our community, and then produced visual art in art therapy sessions. They then exhibited their art in our board room for 2 months, during which time board members, members of the public, and agency partner participants viewed the art and learned about the project. Additionally, we took pictures of an event held in the board room, including the art, crediting the agency. Thus, we were able to reach not only the people physically in our building to see the project, but also all of our social media followers.
