Pledge Summary

The Village of Quogue is located on the east end of Long Island in Suffolk County with a year-round population of approximately 1,000. The Village is a beachfront community with many seasonal residents. By signing the Mayors' Monarch Pledge, Mayor Treuhold has confirmed his commitment to contributing to the crucial efforts to save monarch butterflies and other pollinators. The Mayor looks forward to engaging residents in building more pollinator gardens throughout the Village.

Action Items Committed for 2024

Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. I send a monthly resident newsletter and regularly include reminders to take measures to support environmental initiatives. Reminders have included information and links to how to plant milkweed and pollinator friendly gardens. The newsletter is distributed monthly to over 2,400 recipients. I also promote other efforts by the Quogue Wildlife Refuge and the Westhampton Garden Club.

Engage with community garden groups and urge them to plant native milkweeds and nectar-producing plants.

Please describe the groups you engaged with and how you engaged with these groups below.

I cohosted with the Westhampton Garden Club a "Seed Bomb" event at the Quogue Wetlands Preserve in an effort to plant milkweed in the preserve. As noted above, I am in regular and active contact with the Garden Club to support all of their initiatives. They organize an annual tour of pollinator gardens in the area which I promote in my letters.

As Mayor, I have worked closely with our Highway Department to adapt past practices to be more pollinator friendly. Have also engaged with the Quogue Association, the Quogue Wildlife Refuge and the Quogue Library to ensure a more sustainable approach towards landscaping, etc.

Please describe the extent of engagement with these groups and revisions/maintenance implemented for mowing or planting programs.

As Mayor, I have instructed our Highway Department to identify areas in the Village's right of ways to be left "wild" by reducing and/or limiting mowing and other interventions. In addition to the Wetlands Preserve, I have arranged to have milkweed planted in the Highway Department's storage yard to create an additional monarch friendly area. We have also delayed the spring and fall leaf collection times and encourage residents to forego their fall clean-ups entirely.
