## Pledge Summary

Rochester is a city in North Central Indiana with a population of roughly 19,000. The town is surrounded by rural areas and farmland in the early stages of alternative pesticide methods. It is home to beautiful public parks and gardens with an administration focused on community-building innovatives. Mayor O'Dell of Rochester, IN, has committed to saving monarch butterflies and other pollinators with their signing of the Mayors' Monarch Pledge and looks forward to engaging residents in building more pollinator habitats throughout the city.

## Action Items Committed for 2024

### Communications and Convening

- Engage with city parks and recreation, public works, sustainability, and other relevant staff to identify opportunities to revise and maintain mowing programs and milkweed / native nectar plant planting programs.
- Engage with developers, planners, landscape architects, and other community leaders and organizers engaged in planning processes to identify opportunities to create monarch habitat.
- Create a community art project to enhance and promote monarch and pollinator conservation as well as cultural awareness and recognition.

### Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Add or maintain native milkweed and nectar-producing plants in gardens in the community.

### Systems Change

- Reduce or eliminate the use of herbicides, pesticides, or other chemicals that are harmful to monarchs and pollinators and urban wildlife.

**Please describe your effort in completing this action.**

The strategy we have is using the Monarch Pledge as a platform for the Mayor to spearhead the initiative to not spray pesticides in your Parks, reform our mowing practices, and educate the community through art and activities with children and adolescents to pass the knowledge on to the rest of the citizens. We also work loosely with the Fulton County Soil and Water and Tree Board to promote the planting of trees for our

earth to be clean and rebuilding/enhancing the native plant population that attracts the Monarch population, as well as, other pollinators. We launched this effort by making a press release in the local newspaper publication, as well as, art & education opportunities through the county-wide Summer Parks Program. We continue this project by integrating more social media information and school visits, as well as, strengthening our mowing a lawn maintenance practices. We will also start to work with Purdue Extension to further their outreach of nature preservation/conservation practices that can be used by gardeners and farmers in our area.

Butterfly bushes were removed from the Butterfly Garden and replaced with swamp and milk weed plants, as well as, other native/nectar producing plants. We are also working with the Rochester City Parks Department to add more native plants for the flower beds in the parks for the Monarchs. We are also teaching and using the Summer Parks Program to help further identify other locations for grow monarch habitats in the community.
