## Pledge Summary

Rochester is located in northern Indiana and is home to Lake Manitou. It is nestled in the center of Fulton County and is home to nearly 15,000 people. For the 2025 monarch conversation year, we pledge to expand resources to the Butterfly Garden to increase the number of native plants. Additionally, our Summer Park's Program will focus on raising awareness of the Monarch conversation initiative through community art and literacy projects.

## Action Items Committed for 2025

### Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. (If you have community members who speak a language other than English, we encourage you to also communicate in that language; Champion Pledges must communicate in that language.)
- Engage with city parks and recreation, public works, sustainability, and other relevant staff to identify opportunities to revise and maintain mowing programs and milkweed / native nectar plant planting programs.

- Create a community art project to enhance and promote monarch and pollinator conservation as well as cultural awareness and recognition.

### Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Host or support a native seed or plant sale, giveaway or swap.
- Plant milkweed and pollinator-friendly native nectar plants along roadsides, medians, or public rights-of-way.
- Add or maintain native milkweed and nectar-producing plants in gardens in the community.
- Display educational signage at monarch gardens and pollinator habitat.

- Change weed or mowing ordinances to allow for native prairie and plant habitats.
- Reduce or eliminate the use of herbicides, pesticides, or other chemicals that are harmful to monarchs and pollinators and urban wildlife.

We painted trash cans that are places around the city with a "pollinator theme". This connects our purpose of raising awareness about the decline of our Monarch population, the story walk with Senorita Mariposa, and our beautification initiatives of keeping our parks clean and free of weeds.

The strategy we have is using the Monarch Pledge as a platform for the Mayor to spearhead the initiative to not spray pesticides in your Parks, reform our mowing practices, and educate the community through art and activities with children and adolescents to pass the knowledge on to the rest of the citizens. We also work loosely with the Fulton County Soil and Water and Tree Board to promote the planting of trees for our earth to be clean and rebuilding/enhancing the native plant population that attracts the Monarch population, as well as, other pollinators. We launched this effort by making a press release in the local newspaper publication, as well as, art & education opportunities through the county-wide Summer Parks Program. We continue this project by integrating more social media information and school visits, as well as, strengthening our mowing a lawn maintenance practices. We will also start to work with Purdue Extension to further their outreach of nature preservation/conservation practices that can be used by gardeners and farmers in our area.
