## Pledge Summary

Valley Stream is a village just outside of New York City with a population of about 40,000. The Village is on the south shore of Long Island and is home to over 100 acres of park space in addition to a State park. Mayor Fare is passionate about our environment and understands the importance of the monarch butterfly and other pollinators to our ecosystem. The signing of the Mayor's Monarch Pledge is a commitment with our residents to educate, engage and be active in building more pollinator habitat throughout our Village.

## Action Items Committed for 2024

### Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.

We have been focused on building a partnership with ReWild Long Island who manages a native planting at one of our parks and is a partner in a our new community garden. In 2025 we plan to release in print and on social media, information to encouraged our residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes.

Internally discussions were had with our Parks Dept about creating no-mow areas in which we would plant milkweed and native plantings to provide safe habitat for monarchs and other pollinators. We plan to revisit this for 2025.
