Pledge Summary

Whiting, Indiana is home to an estimated 5,000 people and is located on the shore of beautiful Lake Michigan. The city is in the heart of one of the most diverse ecological areas in the state boasting numerous wetlands and smaller lakes in nearby communities. Despite the beautiful setting, Whiting sits in the middle of a highly industrialized area. Whiting is host to the largest oil refinery in the Midwest, British Petroleum. This industrial area poses environmental challenges of all kinds. Last fall our public park was planted with thousands of native plants, including milkweed for our Monarchs. Plans are for additional plantings this year. Mayor Spebar has signed on to the Monarch Pledge and promises to support the planting of native pollinator plants throughout the city.

Action Items Committed for 2024

Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.

Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Host or support a native seed or plant sale, giveaway or swap.
- Plant or maintain a monarch and pollinator-friendly demonstration garden at City Hall or another prominent or culturally significant community location.
- Add or maintain native milkweed and nectar-producing plants in gardens in the community.
- Display educational signage at monarch gardens and pollinator habitat.

We started a sustainability group (WREN-Whiting Robertsdale Environmental Neighbors). The Monarch Pledge was one idea to increase the number of native plants in our city, to educate people about the function of native plants, and to add beauty to our public places. One members in the group who promoted the idea.

What resources have been most helpful to you thus far and what new resources would you like to see to help meet your goals? What resources would be useful to help expand equitable engagement in community processes and access to high-quality, usable nature?

We had no funding for this. We went to the Mayor to ask for money to purchase the plants and the signage. The library staff helped by having staff there to read to the kids and they brought the bookmobile. The Whiting parks staff helped people sign up for trees. The people have been most helpful. Yearly funding to carry on this project would be most helpful.

What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?

Along with installing the native beds in Whiting-Robertsdale, we also maintain them.
