Pledge Summary

The City of North Kansas City is located in the heart of the Kansas City metropolitan area, with a population of roughly 4,500 residents and just under 5 square miles. North Kansas City is home to several beautiful parks, with the flagship Macken Park being the largest. For almost 20 years North Kansas City has had the proud designation of Tree City USA. Mayor DeLong, along with city council and staff have committed to saving the monarch butterfly and other pollinators with their signing of the Mayor's Monarch Pledge and look forward to engaging residents in building more pollinator habitats throughout the city.

Action Items Committed for 2024

Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. (If you have community members who speak a language other than English, we encourage you to also communicate in that language; Champion Pledges must communicate in that language.)
- Engage with city parks and recreation, public works, sustainability, and other relevant staff to identify opportunities to revise and maintain mowing programs and milkweed / native nectar plant planting programs.

We have started removing Bradford Pear trees and replacing them with native, non-invasive trees. We are also working on updating this policy with our native plants policy.

We are working with a landscaping engineer and City Council to develop a Native Plant Policy that would include city owned spaces and requirement for development landscape, which will encourage use of milkweed. In city spaces we have already begun using milkweed in various areas.

Our native Plant Policy, which is in progress, will set standards for the city to use in public and city owned spaces. A main goal of this policy will be native plants, including milkweed, where appropriate. City crews have already begun planting milkweed in city beds and islands.
