## Action Items Committed for 2025

### Communications and Convening

- Engage with community garden groups and urge them to plant native milkweeds and nectar-producing plants.

Each person was given 10-15 milkweed plants to put in their garden (started in biodegradable egg cartons or toilet paper rolls) with a promise to plant them in their location and to plant lots of nectar flowers for the monarchs to sip on.
