Pledge Summary

Middletown is a small town of about 4,900 people located in the center of the fertile Middletown Valley in western Frederick County, MD. It is home to farms and natural environments that support our community and the natural species that live within it. Our Sustainability Committee recognized by Sustainable Maryland has worked diligently to raise awareness of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. Numerous efforts have been ongoing to help save them which include: our local golf course is working to preserve areas where milkweed grows, mowing patterns have been changed, a pollinator garden has been planted in a highly used park, and public communication efforts have ramped up. Join us in protecting habitat for our local monarch population!

Action Items Committed for 2023

Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. (If you have community members who speak a language other than English, we encourage you to also communicate in that language; Champion Pledges must communicate in that language.)

- Display educational signage at monarch gardens and pollinator habitat.
- Plant milkweed and pollinator-friendly native nectar plants along roadsides, medians, or public rights-of-way.
- Launch, expand, or continue an invasive species removal program that will support the re-establishment of native habitat for monarch butterflies and other pollinators.

Systems Change

The Middletown Sustainability Committee maintains the garden and determines if additional plants are needed, or if plants should be divided, throughout the year. They also help to maintain the plants and keep weeds out. This year we needed to remove snake master plants that were taking over and they were planted in residents own gardens. Sixteen plants were added in an area that was otherwise too bare.

We have traditionally had a pervasive issue of invasive thistle in the Smithfield circle in Town. The Public Works Department has tried to eradicate it, but it keeps coming back. Methods used have been hand-pulling, herbicides. The Town will continue to work to keep it at bay, but our hopes are that the dozens of native plants that have been planted where the thistle is will flourish and eventually leave no room for the thistle.
