Pledge Summary

Buda is a city nestled just south of Austin in the Texas Hill Country. With a population of approximately 16,000 that is experiencing the in-demand growth of Central Texas, Buda strives to maintain the small town feel and charm that its citizens love and are accustomed to. The community of Buda recognizes the importance of monarch butterflies and other pollinator species, not only as a symbol of natural beauty, but also as an essential and crucial aspect for maintaining ecosystem balance. Designated as the Outdoor Capital of Texas, Buda also boasts the achievements of being recognized as a Tree City USA, Monarch City USA, and Bee City USA community.

Action Items Committed for 2024

Communications and Convening

Past habitats have been created at the City's Welcome Center as well as in various public parks. In season, wildflowers grow along the right-of-way of many streets in town, that are left to grow until the monarch season has ended.

As a first time participant of the Mayor's Monarch Pledge, the City used this year to familiarize themselves with the pledge and what resources are available to them through the NWF. In 2025, the City will be proactive in creating additional habitat space and programming to promote wildlife habitat and sensitivities to all communities.

What was your community's motivation for taking and continuing to work on the Mayors' Monarch Pledge?

The City of Buda is a wildlife friendly city, having already obtained Bee City USA and Monarch City USA status. The Mayor's Monarch Pledge was taken to continue Buda's commitment to preserving and creating habitat for all pollinators.

Master Naturalists and Gardeners have been a great resource for us regarding education and best practices.

Buda is very passionate about monarch conservation, and will utilize the NWF resources to continue to preserve habitat and promote conservation and sustainability.

The City of Buda Library will have held 15 workshops with Master Gardeners in 2024, aimed to provide answers to questions, provide valuable resources, and chat about local gardening. Other, more specific workshops with Master Gardeners have included discussion on worm composting, the Texas Superstar Program, Gardens and Bees presentations, and more.

This action was actually completed in 2022. The City has an ordinance that exempts wildflowers from being mowed between April 1st to May 31st.

In progress

The City has actively been working on an application to become a Certified Dark Sky Community through the International Dark Sky Association. Final steps of the application

are being worked through now, with completion of the application process expected in early 2025. The City's lighting ordinance has already been changed earlier this year in further alignment with the Dark Sky Association's requirements and desires, including reduced lumens for light fixtures, no uplighting, and all fixtures must be fully cutoff.

The City has partnered with its Main Street Advisory Board and Sustainability Commission to build and maintain the garden.

Additionally, the City hosted a native plant swap on October 19, 2024, where participants brought in starters and cuttings of various native houseplants, succulents, trees, shrubs, etc for swapping.
