## Pledge Summary

Cedar Falls is a city in North East Iowa with a population of roughly 41,000. The City is home to the University of Northern Iowa, one of the three regent universities in the state, and widely recognized for its endearing mix of bigger city amenities with a small town feel. A nationally recognized downtown and eclectic mix of both urban and rural living lend toward a feeling of home whether you've lived here all your life or are just visiting. But a part of that feeling is only possible because of the balance of city life and natural beauty that Cedar Falls has. Mayor Danny Laudick has committed to ensuring we protect our natural spaces, and part of that commitment includes protecting the native environment and wellbeing of our monarch butterfly and other pollinator species.

## Action Items Committed for 2024

### Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Engage with city parks and recreation, public works, sustainability, and other relevant staff to identify opportunities to revise and maintain mowing programs and milkweed / native nectar plant planting programs.
- Engage with gardening leaders and partners (e.g., Master Naturalists, Master Gardeners, Nature Centers, Native Plant Society Chapters, other long-standing and influential community leaders) to support monarch butterfly conservation.
- Engage with Homeowners Associations (HOAs), Community Associations or neighborhood organizations to identify opportunities to plant monarch gardens and revise maintenance and mowing programs.

### Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Facilitate or support a milkweed seed collection and propagation effort.
- Launch, expand, or continue an invasive species removal program that will support the re-establishment of native habitat for monarch butterflies and other pollinators.

The City of Cedar Falls Parks staff has implemented a pesticide reduction plan that's been ongoing for the past 5 years. We have limited pesticides to athletic fields, public buildings, right of way and certain parks. There is very little herbicide and pesticides applied to 70% of our parks.

The Monarch Club has assisted city staff with planting a milkweed garden to pull from in the future for additional plantings around the community. The North Cedar Neighborhood Association has helped plant and maintains the pollinator areas by mowing and burning when needed to promote growth. The Cedar Valley Monarch Zone donates the majority of the pollinator seed to the city.

Collected Common Milkweed seed from existing prairies around the community and planted them in a 40'x40' plot to create a nursery with plans to collect the seed in the future.

City park staff along with the North Cedar Neighborhood association removed invasive woody vegetation and weeds in a stand of oaks 3 acres in size and planted native pollinator and prairie seed to the understory, creating a oak savanna. The areas was mowed off and treated with herbicide and then seeded in the spring of 2024.
