Pledge Summary

The Town of Townsend is located in central Delaware with a population of roughly 2,400. The Town has the distinction of being designated the first community Wildlife Habitat in the State of Delaware by the National Wildlife Federation on April 24, 2010 and attaining its 10-year certification in 2020. Townsend partnered with the Townsend Elementary School & Delaware Nature Society to plant a butterfly garden at the school in 2016 and partnered with Brownie and Club Scout Troops in 2017, 2018, and 2019 to plant and enhance a butterfly garden at Town Hall. Mayor McDonald has committed to saving the monarch butterfly and other pollinators with his signing of the 2021 Mayors' Monarch Pledge and looks forward to engaging residents in building more pollinator habitat through the Town.

Action Items Committed for 2021

Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.

Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Plant or maintain a monarch and pollinator-friendly demonstration garden at City Hall or another prominent or culturally significant community location.
- Earn or maintain recognition for being a wildlife-friendly city by participating in other wildlife and habitat conservation efforts (i.e., National Wildlife Federation's Community Wildlife Habitat program).

I think the Butterfly Heroes initiative was very engaging and would like to continue its use.

What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?

Our Town exercised (and still does) a great deal of caution due to COVID. We cancelled all of our events - even those that would be outdoors. Our park was closed for most of the year, so we lost our ability to host any events or involve residents in any new undertakings.

The Town of Townsend's initial certification as a Community Wildlife Habitat was achieved by partnering with the Appoquinimink River Association, Delaware Nature Society, Townsend Elementary School Junior Council, DNREC, and others.

Townsend was the first municipality in Delaware to be certified as a Community Wildlife Habitat in 2010. It was re-certified for 10 years in 2020 and will soon receive its 11th year certification.
