Please describe your effort in completing this action.

We focused on enhancing planting sites: sites with milkweed were enhanced by adding native nectar sources such as hyssop, aster, coneflowers; sites with existing native nectar sources were enhanced by adding milkweed. Our sites are visible to the public, which helps educate community members. Plants given away at outreach events become part of town neighborhood habitats, which further educates community members and of course, benefits Monarch life cycles and migration.
