Pledge Summary

Hyde Park is a town in Dutchess County, New York, bordering the Hudson River north of the city of Poughkeepsie. Hyde Park is known as the hometown of Franklin D. Roosevelt, the 32nd president of the United States. It is valuable to note that the National Wildlife Federation was formed during FDR's presidency. The town's commitment to saving the monarch butterfly and other pollinators, with their signing of the Mayor's Monarch Pledge, honors President Roosevelt's passion for conservation and stewardship. Hyde Park looks forward to engaging residents in building more pollinator habitat throughout the town.

Action Items Committed for 2025

Communications and Convening

- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. (If you have community members who speak a language other than English, we encourage you to also communicate in that language; Champion Pledges must communicate in that language.)
- Engage with community garden groups and urge them to plant native milkweeds and nectar-producing plants.

Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Host or support a native seed or plant sale, giveaway or swap.
- Plant or maintain a monarch and pollinator-friendly demonstration garden at City Hall or another prominent or culturally significant community location.
- Earn or maintain recognition for being a wildlife-friendly city by participating in other wildlife and habitat conservation efforts (i.e., National Wildlife Federation's Community Wildlife Habitat program).
- Add or maintain native milkweed and nectar-producing plants in gardens in the community.
- Display educational signage at monarch gardens and pollinator habitat.

- Increase the percentage of native plants, shrubs and trees that must be used in city landscaping ordinances and encourage use of milkweed, where appropriate.

We provide outreach at the town Community Day events. Many low-income and families of color attend these events.

What was your community's motivation for taking and continuing to work on the Mayors' Monarch Pledge?

We live in an area rich in history, the birthplace and life-long home of President Franklin Delano Roosevelt. The Monarch Pledge program is conservation based, and one that FDR would be proud to see fulfilled in his hometown.

What resources have been most helpful to you thus far and what new resources would you like to see to help meet your goals? What resources would be useful to

help expand equitable engagement in community processes and access to high-quality, usable nature?

We did a winter sow workshop, where we planted containers of milkweed seeds for distributing seedlings in the spring. Since we are volunteer based, we depend on local businesses supporting our efforts. We always seek ways to gain donations of supplies needed for these events- so, access to grants, information on funding sources is always helpful.

What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?

We were thrilled to see the Monarch life cycle in all stages at the Native plant garden we installed at Hackett Hill Park & Playground. The families and children were able to see caterpillars, chrysalises and adult Monarchs at this garden. We were just thrilled.

We received a grant from Partners for Climate Action of the Hudson Valley to install two native pollinator gardens. We collaborated with the town hall leadership and the recreation department leadership to get approval for installing the gardens.

We received a grant from Partners for Climate Action of the Hudson Valley to install two native pollinator gardens. We collaborated with the town hall leadership and the recreation department leadership to clear the sites for planting and schedule installation. We gathered volunteers from our Hyde Park Garden Habitat group to help install the plants.

Partners for Climate Action of Hudson Valley provided the grant to install the gardens. A local native plant nursery installed the native trees and shrubs selected for the sites.

We planted native dogwoods, black cherry trees; and for shrubs spicebush, ninebark, serviceberry; many flowering perennials including common, swamp and orange milkweed, asters, lupines, violets, hyssop, false sunflower, black-eyed susan, coneflowers, blazing star, lobelia, cardinal flower.
