Pledge Summary

The Town of Hyde Park registered with the NWF's Community Wildlife Habitat program on Earth Day 2016 to focus on pollinator and native plant choices, to conserve our wildlife, and to work with our community organizations involved with beautification, community gardening, landscape archaeology, and horticultural education. Taking the Mayor's Monarch Pledge aligns perfectly with our community goals. We have installed pollinator gardens that provide both host and feeder plants for the Monarch butterflies.

Action Items Committed for 2026

Communications and Convening

- Engage with community garden groups and urge them to plant native milkweeds and nectar-producing plants.

- Host or support a native seed or plant sale, giveaway or swap.
- Plant or maintain a monarch and pollinator-friendly demonstration garden at City Hall or another prominent or culturally significant community location.
- Add or maintain native milkweed and nectar-producing plants in gardens in the community.

- Launch, expand, or continue an effort to change municipal planting ordinances and practices to include more native milkweed and native nectar producing plants at city properties.

We installed two native pollinator gardens. One is at the Town Hall.. a prime location because it is located on the main street in town and is in a highly visible location. The second is at our town recreation site, also high visibility, and frequented daily by town residents. We have volunteers help with weeding and maintaining the gardens.

Our town supervisor, Al Torregiani, has supported our installation of native milkweed and nectar-producing plants on the grounds of the town hall. This provides a visual of what native pollinator gardens look like for our town residents, further continuing to promote gardening for wildlife and sustainable practices.
