The Village of Pittsford is the oldest village in New York State. It was incorporated in 1827 and has approximately 1300 residents. Located on the Erie Canal, the village is known for its historic homes, extensive old-growth canopy, pocket parks and greenspaces. Mayor Plummer has committed to saving the monarch butterfly and other pollinators with the signing of the Mayors' Monarch Pledge and looks forward to engaging residents in building more pollinator habitats and corridors throughout the village.
