Dobbs Ferry is a village that lies just about 20 miles north of New York City. This riverfront village has a population of 11,000 within its 2.5 square miles of land. With its sloping geography, there is a traditional downtown, as well as generous open spaces. The Village is home to the 76 acre Juhring Nature Preserve, the beautiful Waterfront Park along the Hudson River, as well as two other parks with playgrounds- all of which are enjoyed by many. Mayor Rossillo of Dobbs Ferry NY is excited to transition our Village to a pollinator pathway and is committed to facilitating community actions that support Monarch conservation. With the signing of the Mayors' Monarch Pledge he looks forward to engaging our community in creating vital habitats to sustain pollinators especially Monarchs.

As part of Dobbs Ferry's ongoing commitment to the Mayor's Monarch Pledge, the Village focused on community engagement, education, and habitat support throughout the year. A local high school student, Katie Mooney, proactively reached out to the Village to ask how she could help protect monarch butterflies. Inspired by the goals of the Pledge, she designed an educational flyer encouraging residents to support pollinators—an excellent example of youth leadership and community-driven conservation. The flyer was shared

multiple times through the Mayor's Newsletter (with an approximate distribution of 3,400 residents) and posted on the Village's Facebook page, which has a following of approximately 2,200. These outreach efforts helped broaden awareness of pollinator-friendly practices and reinforced the Village's environmental initiatives. In addition, with support from residents, the Village secured a grant from the Irvington Land Trust to repair fencing around an existing pollinator garden, helping to preserve and enhance established habitat for monarchs and other pollinators. Together, these efforts reflect Dobbs Ferry's continued dedication to education, collaboration, and tangible action in support of the Mayor's Monarch Pledge.

As part of a community outreach effort, the Dobbs Ferry Public Library distributed a limited number of native milkweed plants this spring and summer. The program was promoted locally within the library and was met with such strong interest that the plants were claimed almost immediately, before the opportunity could be shared more broadly through the Library or Mayor's newsletters. While no photos were taken, the enthusiastic response reflected strong community interest in supporting monarch conservation efforts.
