Please describe the extent of engagement with these groups and their monarch butterfly conservation efforts.

Girl Scouts, a couple of families and myself that worked with the Master Gardener from the Penn State extension. We talked with several Local greenhouse owners to find the best varieties of plants for our planting zone and the plants that were liked by butterflies and other pollinators. The Master met regularly with the group and worked with the mayor many days prepping, planting, and cleanup at the end of summer as we prepped for fall months. The area where the garden is located belongs to the borough and it is in the community recreational park. It is small area that was left to growing weeds. It is perfect for our garden because it gets sun, but yet is has a smaller wooded section in the backside. It is out of high traffic yet close enough for visitors of the park to get to. We received donations of mulch from a landscaper, a local hardware store donated a birdbath, Walmart and Lowe's donated over \$100 each in plants, community residents also donated plants to the garden from their own gardens, and another individual donated pea gravel to place throughout the garden area to prevent weed growth
