Pledge Summary

Oklahoma City is committed to monarch conservation efforts. The Oklahoma Zoo, with its mission of conservation, leads our efforts to create and improve habitats for monarchs and other pollinators, both in practice and public education. The Oklahoma City Parks Department plants milkweed gardens throughout the City's extensive park system and creates waystations that provide resources for monarchs during their migration through Oklahoma City. OKC's signature park – the 70-acre Scissortail Park in downtown Oklahoma City – plants some of the monarchs' favorites, such as milkweed and coneflowers, and assists in migration tracking efforts.

Action Items Committed for 2024

How are you leveraging the Mayors' Monarch Pledge program to engage marginalized communities, such as low-income communities or communities of color?

A Fix-it and Flower Festival was held at a senior wellness center in the Northeast OKC. This area has been designated as blighted. Participants were asked to pledge to plant for monarchs. If they signed the pledge, they were given free milkweed plants, pollinator seed mix, grow bags and soil to plant for monarchs and other pollinators. They were also provided with resources about how to plant.

What was your community's motivation for taking and continuing to work on the Mayors' Monarch Pledge?

The community has an active statewide organization, the Oklahoma Monarch and Pollinator Collaborative. This group is very active in OKC continues to generate interest in planting habitat for pollinators.

What resources have been most helpful to you thus far and what new resources would you like to see to help meet your goals? What resources would be useful to help expand equitable engagement in community processes and access to high-quality, usable nature?

We rely on the Oklahoma Monarch and Pollinator Collaborative for most of our resources.

What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?

A Monarch Summit was held in OKC in August 2024. Over 100 key stakeholders from across the state attended this two-day meeting, which reviewed progress on the statewide first five-year monarch and pollinator conservation plan and held planning sessions to develop the next five-year plan.

The Oklahoma City Zoo and Botanical Garden (OKC Zoo) is a City of Oklahoma City Trust. OKC Zoo is located in Northeast Oklahoma City (Northeast OKC). This neighborhood is designated as blighted and has been historically underserved. OKC Zoo organized a Fix-It and Flower Festival event at the senior wellness center in this community to connect residents with nature and empower them to create habitat for native species. Free resources were provided to empower people to plant for pollinators. Those who attended the event and signed a pledge to plant for pollinators received one 10-gallon grow bag, milkweed and nectar plants, and pollinator seeds. Local plant vendors also sold discounted pollinator plants. OKC Zoo and its community partners had information tables to provide resources and have conversations with participants.

Okies for Monarchs is an ongoing public campaign that encourages residents to plant native plants to create pollinator habitat. There is a website with information about how to plant, where to buy, how to register a garden, and has a calendar of events <https://okiesformonarchs.org/>. Multiple outreach events were held in OKC this year. Okies for Monarchs also communicates through social media.
