Oklahoma City is the capital of Oklahoma, located in the heart of the state and the Eastern monarch butterfly's migration pathway. The city is known for its vibrant culture, rich cowboy history, and scenic outdoor spaces, including the Oklahoma City Zoo and Botanical Garden, Myriad Botanical Gardens, and Scissortail Park. Mayor Holt of Oklahoma City has prioritized sustainability efforts by supporting local conservation initiatives and expanding green spaces. Through community engagement, the city is working to enhance pollinator habitats and promote biodiversity, ensuring a healthier environment for future generations.

Action Items Committed for 2025

How are you leveraging the Mayors' Monarch Pledge program to engage marginalized communities, such as low-income communities or communities of color?

The Oklahoma City Zoo and Botanical Garden continued their read for adventure program, that sends a copy of the children's book "Juniper's Butterfly Garden" about monarch butterflies to libraries across the state including the OKC metropolitan area, rural communities, and tribal libraries. As part of this program families that check out the book from their local library receive four free tickets to visit OKC Zoo. Over 150 libraries currently participate in the program. Additionally, the Oklahoma Monarch Society provided monarch educational activities to Positive Tomorrows, an OKC elementary school for children experiencing homelessness; as well as Las Hijas del Sur, a local initiative to connect OK residents with Mexican culture.

What was your community's motivation for taking and continuing to work on the Mayors' Monarch Pledge?

The community has an active statewide organization, the Oklahoma Monarch and Pollinator Collaborative. This group is very active in OKC continues to generate interest in planting habitat for pollinators.

What resources have been most helpful to you thus far and what new resources would you like to see to help meet your goals? What resources would be useful to help expand equitable engagement in community processes and access to high-quality, usable nature?

We rely on the Oklahoma Monarch and Pollinator Collaborative for most of our resources.

What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?

The Oklahoma City Zoo and Botanical Garden, The Oklahoma Monarch Society, and the locally owned news station News 9 traveled to Mexico to visit the overwintering colonies and filmed a special that aired on Sept 10. The special focused on monarch conservation and how Oklahomans can help monarchs.

Okies for Monarchs is an ongoing public campaign that encourages residents to plant native plants to create pollinator habitat. There is a website with information about how to plant, where to buy, how to register a garden, and has a calendar of events <https://okiesformonarchs.org/>. Multiple outreach events were held in OKC this year. Okies for Monarchs also communicates through multiple social media platforms (Facebook, Instagram, etc.).

Following up on the Monarch Summit held in OKC in 2024, representatives from over 50 organizations have continued to work on writing and developing the second five-year statewide Oklahoma Monarch and Pollinator Conservation Plan. Four working groups have been assembled: Lands, Rights-of-Way, Plant and Seed Production, and Urban and Municipal Lands with each group meeting multiple times over the past year and drafting objectives/strategies for the new statewide plan. Some of the organizations represented in these working groups include: Oklahoma Native Plant Network, Oklahoma Native Plant Society, Oklahoma Department of Wildlife Conservation, Oklahoma County Conservation District, Oklahoma Department of Transportation, OKC Beautiful, US Fish and Wildlife Service, Oklahoma Monarch and Pollinator Collaborative, University of Oklahoma, Oklahoma State University, NRCS, Monarch Watch, OKC Zoo, OK Science Museum, Oklahoma Association for Environmental Education, 4-H Master Gardeners.

monarch butterflies including sampling for OE, weighing butterflies, and measuring wings.
Additionally, this year the Oklahoma City Zoo and the Xerces Society, applied six radio
transmitter backpacks to monarch butterflies (XOKC001-XOKC006) at OKC Zoo. These six
butterflies were then tracked on the Project Monarch Science App throughout the rest of
the fall migration.
