## Pledge Summary

Thornton, Colorado, is a City of approximately 140,000 residents in the north Denver metro area, running south to north paralleling the beautiful Colorado Front Range. Thornton Mayor Jan Kulmann is committed to saving the monarch butterfly and other pollinators with the signing of the Mayors' Monarch Pledge. She looks forward to continuing her engagement with residents in developing additional pollinator habitat throughout the City. To improve Monarch life cycle success, Mayor Kulmann has encouraged intentional maintenance practices designed for the restoration of pollinator habitat. These practices include reduction of pesticide use near milkweed in targeted locations and the innovative Naturally Thornton program, converting turfgrass into sustainable and native grasslands. In addition, Mayor Kulmann actively supports the citizen driven Monarch Fly Way initiative, which links City appropriate breeding habitat into a single unified habitat corridor, characterized by appropriate maintenance and public education.

## Action Items Committed for 2025

### Communications and Convening

- Engage with city parks and recreation, public works, sustainability, and other relevant staff to identify opportunities to revise and maintain mowing programs and milkweed / native nectar plant planting programs.

### Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Display educational signage at monarch gardens and pollinator habitat.

### Systems Change

- Reduce or eliminate the use of herbicides, pesticides, or other chemicals that are harmful to monarchs and pollinators and urban wildlife.

We want to be a hospitable municipality for pollinators and a part of flyways and migration corridors for all kinds of animals.

We could use migration maps that would help explain Monarch migration routes and timeframes so that citizens can understand how far these little flyers go.

We plan to expand milkweed planting into prairie dog habitat.

The Parks department refrains from mowing riparian areas, greenways, and open spaces from May-October unless directed to for public safety. Thornton Horticulture received a grant from PPAN (People and Pollinators Action Network) to plant a pollinator garden along the flyway.

Thornton is training its park staff in Integrated Pest Management. IPM uses least toxic solutions, pest and host identification, and action thresholds to limit pesticide use and exposures. With our sized operation we will always be training new staff, and so this action

will never be "Complete". We do hope to have an established policy that minimizes pesticide use by 2028.
