## Pledge Summary

Established in 1833, and incorporated as a City in 1933, the City of Grandville is located along the Grand River in Kent County, Michigan, southwest of Grand Rapids, and bisected by the beautiful Buck Creek tributary of the Grand. The Mayors' Monarch Pledge is a perfect extension of the Growing a Greener Grandville effort the Environmental Sustainability Committee began in November 2023 to certify the city as a Community Wildlife Habitat. The Pledge will help us focus the city's 16,000 residents on specific projects and actions they can take to create and conserve habitat for the Monarch Butterfly and the many other amazing pollinators and creatures that need our thoughtful stewardship for their very survival.

### Program and Demonstration Gardens

Since we're largely building on our existing work in support of the Community Wildlife Habitat program, we have used little of the Mayors' Monarch-specific resources. We DID reference archived Monarch conservation proclamations when creating our own.

**What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?**

We held an outdoor nature education event in September called an Ecoquest at which our Mayor read our city's Monarch Conservation Proclamation, we gave away milkweed and Monarch nectar plants, engaged over 170 adults and children, two of which helped release two Monarch butterflies.

**Please describe the extent of revisions or maintenance to invasive species removal programs, as well as the practices or techniques used to remove the invasive plants.**

Each spring since 2023 the Grandville Environmental Sustainability Committee and their Growing a Greener Grandville effort has coordinated a garlic mustard pull at Mill Race Park and on other public and private land along Buck Creek, a tributary to the Grand River. The 2025 event was held on May 18th. In the those three years over 150 pounds of mustard has been removed from the watershed. The work will continue in 2026 as well as the broader efforts to educate the community on invasive species, in general.
