## Pledge Summary

Milwaukie is a suburb of Portland with a population of approximately 22,000 residents. Milwaukie Bay, in the Willamette River, is the point at which both Johnson Creek and Kellogg Creek empty into the Willamette River. Milwaukie residents have a deep tie to the natural areas in our community, and the City Council recently selected Enhancing Parks and Greenspaces as one of our Council Goals for 2025-2027. The City has joined with local advocates, including the Rotary Club, the Historic Milwaukie Neighborhood Association, and the Milwaukie Parks Foundation, in attaining Bee City, U.S.A. status and launching the Milwaukie Pollinator Pathway. Mayor Lisa Batey is excited to add this Monarch Pledge to the work the community is doing to support pollinators.

## Action Items Committed for 2025

### Communications and Convening

- Engage with gardening leaders and partners (e.g., Master Naturalists, Master Gardeners, Nature Centers, Native Plant Society Chapters , other long-standing and influential community leaders) to support monarch butterfly conservation.

### Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Earn or maintain recognition for being a wildlife-friendly city by participating in other wildlife and habitat conservation efforts (i.e., National Wildlife Federation’s Community Wildlife Habitat program).
- Display educational signage at monarch gardens and pollinator habitat.

### Systems Change

The Mayors' Monarch Pledge is a good companion piece to Milwaukie's Bee City, USA certification. Although monarch sightings in the Portland metro area are relatively rare, we are hopeful that enhanced pollinator plantings will support any monarchs that do pass our way.

The City of Milwaukie regularly engages with a wide variety of groups active in the conservation sphere in our Earth Day, Arbor Day and other events: the Rotary Club of Milwaukie's Environmental team, the Milwaukie Parks Foundation, the Milwaukie Environmental Stewards Group, the Milwaukie Garden Club, the Johnson Creek Watershed Council, the North Clackamas Watersheds Council, Clackamas County Master Gardeners and the Xerces Society, among others. Milwaukie staff additionally work with counterparts at the City of Portland, Oregon Metro (regional government), the North Clackamas Parks and Recreation District and Clackamas Water Environment Services (wastewater treatment provider). Pollinator conservation was a featured part of the City's 2025 Earth Day event as well as the Milwaukie Sustainability Fair in September, led by the Milwaukie Environmental Stewards Group.

Milwaukie also provides some financial support for the Backyard Habitat Certification Program, operated by the Bird Alliance of Oregon (formerly Audubon) and the Columbia Land Trust. Milwaukie now displays Bee City USA signs on three arterial streets as one drives into our community. Further, the Pollinator Pathway project has placed signs along the downtown streetscape where community groups have adopted different blocks and corners for pollinator gardens. Pollinator Pathway signage is also available to residents and businesses who register those pollinator gardens they have planted.

The City of Milwaukie does not use pesticides at City facilities, and we follow Portland's Integrated Pest Management (IPM) plan in management of other public properties. A Milwaukie-specific IPM incorporating Bee City principles (no persistent pesticides) will be created and implemented by February 2026. Milwaukie is part of the North Clackamas Parks and Recreation District, which also follows an IPM plan.
