Pledge Summary

Buffalo Grove's Village President has taken the Monarch Pledge, committing to a series of actions aimed at supporting the monarch butterfly population and other pollinators in the village. In partnership with the National Wildlife Federation, the Village of Buffalo Grove, Illinois, will implement various conservation efforts, including habitat creation, educational programs, and community engagement events. By preserving and enhancing local ecosystems, Buffalo Grove is taking important steps towards protecting the environment and ensuring a sustainable future for its residents.

Action Items Committed for 2023

Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. (If you have community members who speak a language other than English, we encourage you to also communicate in that language; Champion Pledges must communicate in that language.)
- Engage with community garden groups and urge them to plant native milkweeds and nectar-producing plants.
- Engage with city parks and recreation, public works, sustainability, and other relevant staff to identify opportunities to revise and maintain mowing programs and milkweed / native nectar plant planting programs.
- Engage with gardening leaders and partners (e.g., Master Naturalists, Master Gardeners, Nature Centers, Native Plant Society Chapters, other long-standing and influential community leaders) to support monarch butterfly conservation.

Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Host or support a native seed or plant sale, giveaway or swap.
- Facilitate or support a milkweed seed collection and propagation effort.
- Plant or maintain a monarch and pollinator-friendly demonstration garden at City Hall or another prominent or culturally significant community location.
- Plant milkweed and pollinator-friendly native nectar plants along roadsides, medians, or public rights-of-way.
- Launch or maintain an outdoor education program(s) (e.g., at schools, after-school programs, community centers and groups) that builds awareness and creates habitat by engaging students, educators, and the community in planting native milkweed and

pollinator-friendly native nectar plants (i.e., National Wildlife Federation's Schoolyard Habitats program and Monarch Mission curriculum).

Systems Change

- Change weed or mowing ordinances to allow for native prairie and plant habitats.
- Increase the percentage of native plants, shrubs and trees that must be used in city landscaping ordinances and encourage use of milkweed, where appropriate.
- Launch, expand, or continue an effort to change municipal planting ordinances and practices to include more native milkweed and native nectar producing plants at city properties.
- Integrate monarch butterfly conservation into the city's Park Master Plan, Sustainability Plan, Climate Resiliency Plan or other city plans.

Buffalo Grove is committed to sustainability, and prides itself on maintaining many acres of natural areas. Recognizing the value of pollinators like the monarch butterfly, the village works with a team of volunteers to provide community outreach and provide ways to support the monarch butterfly at their own homes in addition to the Village and Park District's efforts.

What resources have been most helpful to you thus far and what new resources would you like to see to help meet your goals? What resources would be useful to help expand equitable engagement in community processes and access to high-quality, usable nature?

Our volunteer team works closely with Village and Park District staff to plan events to educate and engage the community on the importance of the monarch butterfly and pollinators. This collaborative relationship has contributed greatly to the growth of efforts to save the monarch butterfly in Buffalo Grove.

What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?

BG's Save the Monarchs volunteer group is currently working with local church congregations to plant pollinator gardens. The volunteer that leads this group is also a member of the Illinois Monarch project and hands out nectar seed packets provided by the Illinois Chapter of the Sierra Club/ Woods & Wetlands group.

96 pounds of seeds were processed to cover 8-10 acres of new basin and prairie areas in our village and parks, saving taxpayer dollars.

The native plant garden is located in a basin behind Village Hall, 50 Raupp Blvd in Buffalo Grove. In 2017, the Village converted a turf grass detention basin west of Village Hall and north of Lake Cook Road, to a pollinator-friendly area featuring a rich mixture of native plants. The Village partnered with Siemens and the Buffalo Creek Clean Watershed Partnership to bring this important educational area to fruition. Pollinator-friendly areas are continually sought to be converted with pollinator supporting plants throughout the Village each year.
