The borough is home to almost 100 acres of parkland and has the east branch of the Brandywine River running through its center. We have purchased 5 signs from Victory Garden of Tomorrow (<https://www.victorygardenoftomorrow.com/garden>). They include Firefly habitat information, Leave the Leaves, No Mow, and Pollinator Garden. We also created a Leave the Leaves sign specific to our town and why we're choosing to let the leaves stay in a certain section of Kerr Park, the most visited park in our borough. We've placed Pollinator Habitat signs in a new garden installation in Johnstontown Park along a popular walking trail and in an established Pollinator Garden in the heart of downtown at Armor Alley.

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Where is the demonstration garden located and how does this location relate to the cultural significance of the monarch (if relevant)? (Please provide an address or coordinates, if possible)

The garden was installed in Johnstown Park (122 Viaduct Ave, Downingtown PA 19335). There is limited cultural significance but more awareness concerning the plight of the Monarch. Monarchs migrate through Chester County in May heading north and in August-October heading south.

What community organizations, groups, or leaders (if any) did you partner with or engage to complete this effort?

We engaged with the local government, the Shade Tree Commission and Public Works. We received donated garden design by MSE landscape associates and grants from the Pennsylvania Native Plant Society and Xerces Society. We had several community

volunteer opportunities for site prep, planting days, and weeding days throughout the year resulting in approximately 50+ different volunteers including honor students and scouts.

What is the total acreage of land treated to remove invasive plants?

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Please describe the extent of revisions or maintenance to invasive species removal programs, as well as the practices or techniques used to remove the invasive plants.

We removed Japanese pachysandra (by hand) from under a bridge next to a pollinator garden we're planting. We replaced the pachysandra with native *Packera aurea* - golden ragwort - and native ferns, Ostrich and Christmas. Throughout the growing season we also removed invasive weeds growing in the pollinator garden.
