The city of Ocala has a variety of beautiful parks that range from upland pines, oak hammocks, urban communities, and retention and recharge wetland ponds. Different parks offer different amenities such as playground equipment, walking trails and courts for various sports. With volunteer opportunities available for both outdoor and indoor facilities, Park Rangers and Recreation crews assist with environmental education and outreach initiatives throughout the year.

Our education kit is available to be borrowed by our local Boys and Girls Club and community centers. Our summer Park program hosted 9 "parties" in our local pocket neighborhood parks, while we also provided a free lunch, ice cream, science activities, recreational play and art projects. Having this kit accessible for staff and volunteers to use year-round will be a great asset, and allow more programming to occur outside in our neighborhood parks as well.

What was your community's motivation for taking and continuing to work on the Mayors' Monarch Pledge?

Many of our staff and affiliates are familiar with NWF curriculum for habitat steward efforts and certifications. This pledge allowed conversations to be had on utilizing native or Florida Friendly landscaping while learning the difference of milkweed plants.

What resources have been most helpful to you thus far and what new resources would you like to see to help meet your goals? What resources would be useful to help expand equitable engagement in community processes and access to high-quality, usable nature?

Project WILD Monarch lesson is always impactful for all ages. Having physical models and stages of metamorphosis, migration patterns, and food webs with pesticide bioaccumulation has really been engaging and eye opening to our residents.

What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?

We have started collecting our most effective teaching tools and lesson plans to create a traveling trunk for outdoor education programs, field trips, and outreach opportunities.

In review of the park, this site had both previous NWF certifications and bird habitat certifications. We recertified the butterfly garden and replaced 2 bird houses that were broken. Volunteers spent time learning about different pollinator wildflowers and the tropical milkweed variety and issues that can be caused, along with habitat loss and pesticide use.

Please describe the extent of revisions or maintenance to invasive species removal programs, as well as the practices or techniques used to remove the invasive plants.

Manual removal at Scott Springs Park, Heritage Nature Conservancy, and Fort King National Historic Landmark, which was mostly skunkvine, cesar weed, and air potato, and allowed light to move in. With this, aquatic milkweed species was replanted along the trails and pods collected to start more plantings in the spring 2026!
