Pledge Summary

The Village of Croton-on-Hudson, through initiatives like those of its Conservation Advisory Council, supports Monarch Butterflies by promoting the planting of native milkweed and nectar-producing plants. Additionally, the village engages in public communication efforts to encourage residents to create Monarch-friendly gardens within their own properties.

Action Items Committed for 2025

Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. (If you have community members who speak a language other than English, we encourage you to also communicate in that language; Champion Pledges must communicate in that language.)
- Engage with community garden groups and urge them to plant native milkweeds and nectar-producing plants.

- Launch, expand, or continue an effort to change municipal planting ordinances and practices to include more native milkweed and native nectar producing plants at city properties.
- Integrate monarch butterfly conservation into the city's Park Master Plan, Sustainability Plan, Climate Resiliency Plan or other city plans.

The Village of Croton-on-Hudson contracted with Trillium Invasive Species Management to control phragmites in the following parks and open space areas: Gouveia Park, Duck Pond Park, Senasqua Park, Croton Landing Park and Kaplan's Pond Open Space Area. This has been an ongoing project since 2015 and the permit to conduct this work was last renewed in August 2025.
